Sterling Drops One Cent

Sterling is quoted at \$3.97, a drop of one cent over the quotation of yesterday. Drachmas are \$13. Francs on France are \$18.25. Francs on Belgium stand at \$18.90. Kroners on Norway are quoted at \$17.75. Kroners on Sweden are \$22.25. Liras on Italy are \$16.13. Marks on Germany are \$2.75.

Wheat Haying After July 4

It is probable that wheat haying will begin after July 4, according to Umatilla county farmers. Harvest will probably not begin until August 1, being about a month later this year than last year. Word from Walla Walla farmers says that their harvest will begin about July 15, the season being earlier than here.

Columbia Basin Trip Coming

Invitations have been received by the editorial department of the East Oregonian to be represented on a tour of the Columbia Basin project on July 8, 9 and 10, under the auspices of the Spokane Chamber of Commerce. The trip will include Quincy, Ephrata, Soap Lake, Othello, Cuningbham, Pasco and Yakima. The tour ends at Yakima on Saturday, July 10. The lower end of this project is about Pasco.

Hermiston Meeting Today

The meeting of the Hermiston committee to meet with the appropriations committee of the house of representatives, scheduled for last night at Her-

minston, was postponed until today. K. Cranston, representing the Pendleton Commercial Association, is in the west end town today to confer with regard to the part this city is to play in the entertainment of the guests.

Wheat Contracts Not Plentiful

Contracting for wheat of this year's crop has slowed down in the last few days, says a local dealer, owing to the inability of buyers and growers to get together on the price. Growers desire to sell on the \$2.50 basis or better but buyers have not felt willing to bid more than \$2.40. As a result there is little contracting. The faith of farmers in their crops is evidenced by a little firmer market for base and the demand is expected to pick up late this month.

City to Seek Bids

The city of Pendleton will advertise at once for bids on the paving of three blocks on Garfield street, for which revised estimates and specifications have been completed and accepted by the council. The advertisement of this one section is made to ascertain whether the city can float paving bonds at this time. If the bonds can be floated, other street improvements will be advertised as soon as practicable.

Recruits Are Expected

R. Carr, local navy recruiting officer, says that prospects for recruiting among ex-service men are good. He states that in the Dayton and Walburg region, which he visited recently several ex-service men wish to join the navy after harvest, while a few may join before harvest begins.

Police Court Collects \$114

The city police court during June collected, in fines and forfeitures, \$114. There were 49 cases before the court, of which 31 were for violations of the traffic code and 24 for violations of the drunk and disorderly ordinance. One was for running over a fire hose and the other for illegal possession of liquor.

Evening Fishing Best

With the warm days and warm water, fishing in the morning and evening now is the best, Sol Baum said today. He and Loren Hoover last evening fished the river between Thorn Hollow and Cayuse, their catch including 16 trout of 11 inches and better. The fish will not bite now during the heat of the day, the fishermen say.

Phil Rouns, one of the members of the firm of Royal Sawtelle's, Inc., leaves tomorrow for Spokane for a vacation. He will visit the lakes in that region. J. H. Gorman, who is employed in the store, left yesterday for Hood River to spend two weeks with his family who went down recently to spend the summer.

109 Families Served

One hundred nine families were served during the past month by the Home Service section of the Red Cross, according to a report given out today by Miss Virginia Todd, secretary. The section of the Red Cross returned to the Home Service office by families who had borrowed from the relief fund, and the sum of \$185.66 was loaned out during the month.

Bridge at Cayuse Goes Out

The country bridge across the Umatilla river at Cayuse went out yesterday, according to word brought here by Sol Baum. He says that it sank so far in the center that traffic across it is impossible and persons must detour in order to cross the river there. The road to Gibbon and Pincham Springs via Thorn Hollow is in fine shape now, he says, and is the better way to take.

Issued Repair Permit

E. W. Myers and Nettie Myers were issued a permit yesterday afternoon to make repairs to a dwelling at a cost of \$150. Their permit brought the total of work for June to \$17,715. There was one permit of consequence issued during the month, that being for the erection of a new building on Garden street by W. E. Hanson. The remaining 12 permits were for amounts of \$500 or under and included chiefly repairs or small garages.

Police Committee Gives Consent

The police committee of the city council today gave its approval to the petition of the Central Labor Council for a permit to hold a carnival here late this month. The approval is contingent, however, upon the show's making good the promises made for it last night. The committee reserved the right to eliminate any feature of the carnival which might be construed by it as objectionable. There was a minority vote against granting the concession.

Furniture Arrives

Furniture for the lodge room in the new Elks building has arrived and is being stored until the building is ready. The furniture cost \$5,500 and is of gray oak especially designed by A. E. Doyle, of Doyle and Reese. The upholstery is of triple velvet in an attractive stripe showing a color scheme of purple to harmonize with the deep purple velvet hangings. The furniture includes wall settees, chairs, secretary's desk and a three piece stage set. Walls of the room are to be finished in soft gray and purple stipple effect and the woodwork will be gray also.

Working on Road

The Warren Construction Company is concentrating its labor on the Athena-Milton road, which is a 12 mile project. The work goes on for three days a week, full time being impossible at present because of a shortage of rock. Next week, however, the quarry at Blue Mountain will supply sufficient rock for daily work. Two cars of crushing equipment are now on the way here and will be installed near Weston, in addition to the crusher at Blue Mountain and Athena. By tomorrow the final work on the Adams-Athens stretch will be finished, but the short detour at Adams will be necessary because the bridge is not yet completed. By September 1 the construction company expects to have finished its work in the country, with the exception of five miles between Blue Mountain and Weston, which is not to be paved for a time.
