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BRYAN'S MISSION EXPLAINED

THE presence of William Jennings Bryan in the San Francisco convention may be explained in his statement of yesterday that "if I can help this world banish alcohol, after that banish war; if I can do that, no office, no presidency, can offer the honors that will be mine." Bryan, apparently, is in the convention hall first to see the dry cause win. After that he is ready to consider the league of nations issue.

In his uncompromising stand on the liquor question, Bryan probably will be found to disagree with the administration and the platform eventually adopted. Public sentiment throughout the nation is believed by the party leaders to run to the "personal liberty" platform and the hue and cry for months has risen from many quarters, "light wines and beer."

In order to carry his point, Bryan must carry weight not alone in the making of the platform but in the choice of the candidates as well. While Bryan, in any situation, can make his influence widely felt, all agree that putting across his bone dry program at San Francisco will be a big task. They point to the stand taken by President Wilson with regard to the Volstead act and look for a plank just a "bit moist."

A REMARKABLE CASE

NEVER in the recollection of man has there been a case quite like that of William G. McAdoo with regard to the democratic nomination. Few men there are within the borders of this or any other nation who would consistently refuse the honor of running for the highest office in their nation. It appears, however, that McAdoo is one of these exceptions.

One of the favorite arguments in newspapers hostile to the democratic party explained McAdoo's refusal to consider the nomination as grandstand play. Many declared that he courted coining, that he sought to appear reluctant in order to play the hero. These theories appear to have been scouted thoroughly. There is too much consistency in McAdoo's refusal to allow his name to go before the democratic convention.

McAdoo's family is believed responsible chiefly for his desire to keep out of the great political race. Mrs. McAdoo, daughter of President Wilson, saw her mother pass away in the white house and the health of her father broken down by the cares of his second term. She is known to oppose her husband's candidacy.

McAdoo is admittedly of presidential timber. He is the business man, the executive and the statesman. His public record is one of big achievements and of success. But he is apparently sincere in reiterating that he does not aspire to the highest office in the nation where success is attended at best by the harassing criticisms of present day partisanship.

GOVERNMENT AID

PERSONS not close students of government may not realize what benefits are being derived in this section from co-operation by local agencies and the federal government. The forthcoming visit to Hermiston and to the McKay creek reservoir site is just one example of the aid which is being made possible by federal cooperation.

Unless signs fail, this project stands to receive funds for development. The government appropriation for the McKay development is confidently expected and the visit of the house committee here is taken to indicate speedy realization of this \$2,500,000 idea.

When the state highway commission cut out the two proposed crossings of the Old Oregon Trail near Echo, it meant \$113,500 from the government. The federal post roads funds became available for construction of this highway. Funds from another federal department are expected to be made available for building the new road to Grant county's line because of the penetration of a heavily timbered area.

The federal government is doing things for Umatilla county and will continue to do things, if Umatilla county will only point out its needs and go after the aid. A lot can be accomplished by a worthy reception to the men who will be in the county July 16.

Just another evidence that Pendleton has opportunities for the man who grasps them is seen in the painting upon office windows in Seattle and Colfax the name "H. W. Collins."

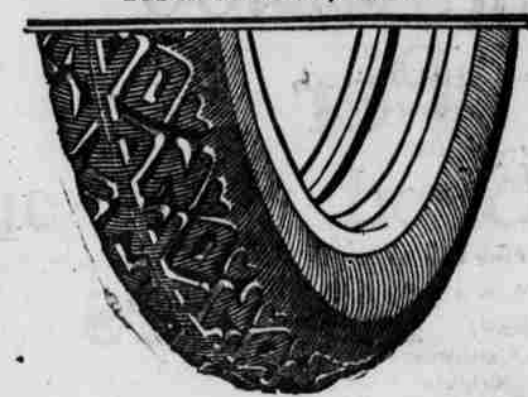
