After one demonstration had con-

tinued for 27 minutes today Chairman Robinson pounded for order. He produced no effect. At the half hour mark the noise had died down considerably. Robinson again pounded desperately but the Pennsylvania delegates refused to give up. Robinson sent out for police to help clear the aisle.

The nomination of Palmer was accompanied by the first real noisy and prolonged demonstration of the convention. It ran up towards a half hour with delegates from Pennsylvania and Georgia leading the crowd. Standards of Maine and Port Rico also got into the parade. As it churned around the convention floor, Maroon Palmer penants and small American flags were carried by marchers as they cut lines through the crowd of delegates and sang their marching songs over and over again. Palmer men pranced about chanting the celebrated parody "Glory, Glory Penn" to the tune of "Glory, Glory Hallelujah." The same tune was kept up by the band in the organ loft and in between times a crew of cheer leaders kept the convention floor pepped up.

The sub-committee plank proposing to leave the settlement of the Irish question to the league of nations was rejected today by the full platform committee which also voted down by a majority of 2 to 1 the blanket proposal favoring Irish independence.

Governor Cornwall of West Virginia made an effective speech, nominating Ambassador Davis. The southern women made a hit with the second speeches, saying the league plank in the platform comes from the fields of France.

McAdoo was unnecessary, as there were enough anti-McAdoo delegates already to insure his defeat without the aid of centralized leadership.

Claim 400 Vote Block

(By Associated Press)

SAN FRANCISCO, July 1.—Irreconcilable opponents of McAdoo claimed a block of at least 400 bitter-enders who would stand to the last and prevent his nomination. McAdoo leaders claimed to have within 50 votes of the necessary two thirds, and declared that they were sure of the accession attracted by their showing of strength.

During the debate in the resolutions committee, senator Glass and Bryan clashed over Bryan's published criticisms of the sub-committee as a "secret body." When Senator Glass objected to it, Bryan replied that he would use it again, or any other word he should choose.

Seek Dark Horse
Vice-president Marshall had been talked of to head the combination against McAdoo. There was also mention of Cummings.

As a counter move to meet the combination against the McAdoo administration forces were scouting for a dark horse of their own who could break the combination if it proved effective.

Gain Little Headway

SAN FRANCISCO, July 1.—Overnight conferences of forces seeking to effect the combination to defeat the nomination of McAdoo, failed to reach any agreement on a candidate, and their only accomplishment seemed to be a stiffening of determination to hold solid and if possible to veto the block of votes.

He alleges cruelties and says that the defendant has refused to live with him for the past six months. A suit and counter suit were filed by the same parties a year ago, the case finally being thrown out of court by Circuit Judge Phelps with the direction to the couple to settle their differences. James A. Fee represents the plaintiff in the action.

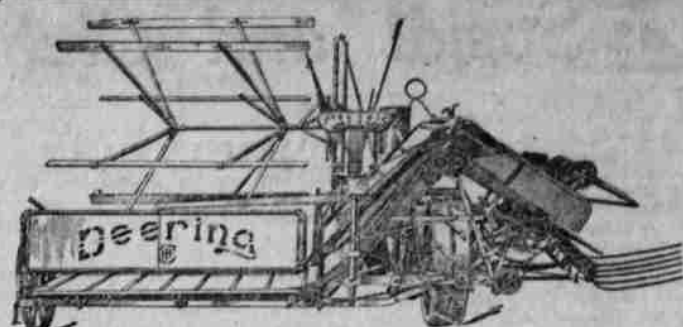
