

JOSEPH N. SCOTT WINS NOMINATION DRAWING

Joseph N. Scott, Umatilla county farmer and a resident of Pendleton was successful in the drawing yesterday at Salem for the democratic nomination for representative in the 22d district, including Umatilla and Morrow counties.

Mr. Scott is at present in San Francisco attending the democratic national convention and has made no statement as to whether or not he will be a candidate at the general election in November.

Roy Bailey, of this city, C. E. Woodson, of Heppner and Mr. Scott each received a vote for the office, their names being written in on the ballot. The tie made the drawing necessary. Mr. Woodson is the regular republican nominee for representative from the 22d district.

LICENSE ENFORCEMENT TO AWAIT AMPLE TIME

Enforcement of the new automobile license law will not begin here until ample time has been allowed for drivers to receive licenses from the secretary of state, although the law goes into effect today.

Such was the announcement made today by Rosemary I. Keator, district attorney, who says that as hundreds have mailed application for licenses, there has been difficulty in supplying the demand at the secretary of state's office in Salem. Many local people state that they have not yet received the licenses.

District Attorney Keator states that after licenses have been supplied, the law will be strictly enforced as a means of protecting travelers on roads and streets, and to keep incompetents from driving. The law provides that a driver must be 16 years of age or over, and must carry a license or be subject to penalty. The driver must carry the license on his person, this requirement being similar to the requirement for fishing and hunting licenses.
