PARIS PAPERS DECLARE ALLIES ARE AGREED

(By United Press.)

PARIS, July 5.—Newspapers are unanimous in declaring today that the allies had gone to the Spa in complete agreement regarding questions to be discussed with German delegates. The consensus of newspapers was that France receive 52 per cent. of the German indemnity, England, 22 per cent., Italy nine and a half, Serbia, five, and Belgium, eight. The balance would be divided among other belligerent of the world war. There is

the exact figure of the reparations total. Many conflicting reports are circulated.

The Matin printed an interview obtained by a Spa correspondent with Jonastantin Fahrenbach in which the German chancellor declared that Germany had no proposals to make regarding a definite sum to be paid as indemnity. "Annunities should be paid in accordance with Germany's economic rehabilitation," Fahrenbach declared. "It will be necessary to modify the clause of the peace treaty stipulating that Germany may pay the equivalent of twenty billion gold marks before April, 1921. We oppose a forfeiture of principles regarding the indemnity payment in belief that a forfeit would virtually place Germany in servitude."

A Spa dispatch said Germany was

apparently determined that the maximum indemnity should not exceed fifty billion gold marks.

The Germans will offer to begin trial of those responsible for the war and guilty of other war crimes immediately. They will demand revision of treaty clauses for the purpose of facilitating fulfillment of Germany's coal delivery obligations.

Josephine county—Sexton mountain section, 7.5 miles of grading.
Linn county—Albany-Tangent, 7.4 miles of grading.
Marion county—Salem south, 7.2 miles of grading.
Polk county—Yamhill county line-Butler's store, 7.6 miles of grading and rocking.
Sherman county—Columbia River

highway, 14.3 miles of grading.

Tillamook county—Riverdale-Hobsonville, 4.4 miles of grading; Moore cutoff, 3 miles of grading; Reaver-Hobo, 4.7 miles of grading.

Union county—Elgin-Minam, 9.3 miles of grading; Perry-LaGrande, 2.5 miles of grading; North Powder-Tolocaset, 9 miles of grading.

Yamhill county—Sheridan-Polk county line, 4.5 miles of grading; Newberg-Chehalum creek, 1.5 miles of grading.

Contracts probably will not be awarded by the commission until tomorrow.

MOTORCYCLE RACERS AVERAGE 81 MILES

DODGE CITY, Kan., July 5.—Jimmy Davis of Columbus, Ohio, won the 300-mile dirt track motorcycle race here Monday, establishing a new record for the track of 3:40:44. The average speed was better than 81 miles an hour.

Walker finished second and Ray Wishart third. "Speck" Warner was fourth. Maldyn Jones won the honors at 200 miles, in 2:11:12 2-5 an average of 54 1-2 miles an hour.

At the end of the 12th O'Dowd had the edge of seven rounds, McKay led in two and three were even. O'Dowd forced the fighting from the start, excelling at close range, while McKay's only points were scored in long distance fighting.

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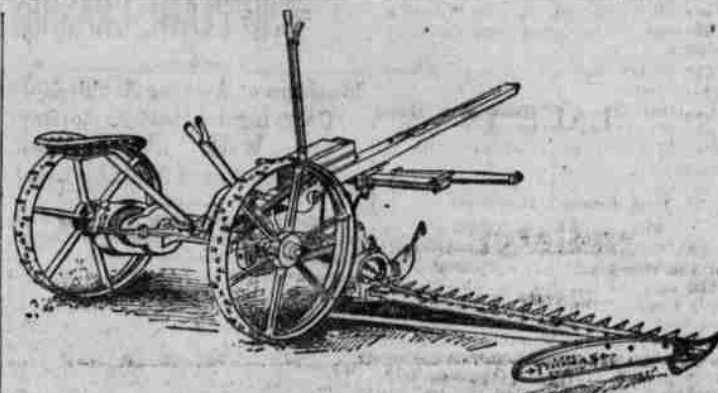

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187 TOWNS JOIN IN SECURING PICTURES

Motion picture exhibitors from 187 towns in the Northwest have just completed an Independent Booking Circuit, for the collective purchase of motion picture features. C. G. Matlock, manager of Pendleton's three motion picture houses, returned this morning from the meeting, which was held in Seattle.

The Independent Booking Circuit, Mr. Matlock said, will aim to get better pictures and keep prices within reasonable limits. The smaller exhibitors are allied with Jensen & Von Herbers, who own houses in Seattle, Tacoma, Spokane, Portland and several smaller northwest towns.

A committee of four to represent Oregon in the advisory board was selected and Mr. Matlock was chosen as one of this committee. Better and newer features for Pendleton will result from the new organization, Mr. Matlock says.
