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TOMMY MILTON WINS TACOMA CLASSIC IN FAST TIME OF 2:23.28

Speed Demon Averages 95 Miles an Hour Over 225 Mile Course, Showing Dust to Mulford and Hearne.

TACOMA, Wash., July 6.—Tommy Milton, racing off 225 miles in two hours, 23 minutes and 28 seconds, won the ninth annual speedway contest here Monday afternoon. He averaged 95 miles an hour, the fastest time yet made on the local track in a race of more than 100 miles. He won the \$15,000 first prize.

Mulford was second and the other drivers finished in this order: Hearne, Klein, Barles, Murphy, Gaston Chevrolet, and O'Donnell.

Chevrolet, winner of the Indianapolis race on Memorial Day, had motor trouble. Ralph DePalma was the victim of bad luck all day. His French car was unable to start the race and he started in the American car of Eddie Miller but was forced to quit on account of engine trouble. Durant, Thomas and Boyer were also forced out.

A crowd of 40,000 persons saw the race, the sensational feature of which was the contest between Milton and Mulford. There was not an accident to mar the day.

SOUTH WINS ARMY MEET.

ST. LOUIS, July 6.—The departmental field and track championship of the United States army won by the southern department Monday afternoon when its representatives won six of the 12 final events at the army meet here and ran the total point scores to 128 1-2.

OAKS GET ONE OF TWO AND WIN WEEK'S PLAY

PORTLAND, July 6.—Portland and Oakland again broke even. Monday's double header gave the home team a 6 to 5 victory in the first contest and the Oaks a 2 to 0 shutout in the second. The Oaks made their winning runs in the second game off Polson in the ninth. Bert Glasier, a recruit pitcher, won an uphill game for Portland after Kallio had been knocked out of the box in the third with four runs. Portland scored six runs in the eighth and trimmed the Oaks 6 to 5. Oakland won the series, five games to four.

Break Even at Seattle.
SEATTLE, July 6.—Vernon and Seattle split Monday's doubleheader, Vernon winning the first game, 6 to 4, and Seattle the second, 5 to 4. Piercey struck out nine in the first game. The second was a pitchers' battle between Schorr and W. Mitchell, the former winning his third straight game.

Angels Win Both Games.
LOS ANGELES, July 6.—Los Angeles won both games with Sacramento, the morning, 4 to 2, and the afternoon, 5 to 4. Each game was a pitcher's battle. The afternoon game went 10 innings.

Seals and Bees Split.
SAN FRANCISCO, July 6.—San Francisco and Salt Lake compromised on a doubleheader, the Bees taking the first game, 2 to 1, and the Seals the second, 3 to 2. The morning game was a pitchers' duel.

LEONARD RETAINS HIS TITLE WITH KNOCKOUT FOR WHITE IN NINTH

Champion Puts Challenger to Sleep for First Time in His 145 Fights and Sixth Battle for Crown.

BENTON HARBOR, Mich., July 6.—Benny Leonard, the lightweight champion of the world, fighting his first battle in six months, knocked out the dangerous hitting Charley White of Chicago in the ninth round of a bitterly fought scheduled 16 round championship contest here Monday afternoon. The battle fought before a crowd of 12,000 to 15,000 persons, was finished amid tremendous excitement and the end came when it looked as if White was going to stay the limit and perhaps hold the champion even.

White carried the fight to Leonard and had the better of five of the first seven rounds. He fought a game battle and surprised his admirers until Leonard landed a smash on the chin early in the ninth round. He knocked and partly shoved Leonard through the ropes in the fifth round. The champion fell outside the ring and the referee had counted four before Leonard was pushed back inside the ropes.

How to Chin Counts.
A short right hand punch to the chin which Leonard had been trying to land all through the fight was the start of White's finish in the ninth. White dropped to his hands and knees and although dazed, refused to take the count. Leonard saw instantly that White was badly stunned and rained blows with both hands to the weakened and fast fading Chicagoan. White was knocked down four times, once half way through the ropes, before he was counted out. He was half lying on his wife and half on his haunches when Referee Smith finished the count. White was completely out and fell to the floor once after his seconds had picked him up.

White's First Knockout.
It was the first time that White, the veteran of 145 fights, had ever been knocked out and it was his sixth chance at the lightweight championship.

As the referee raised Leonard's hand as a sign of victory, the crowd surged through the press stand to the ring-side, injuring several of the spectators, breaking seats and tearing down telegraph wires. A cordon of police was drawn around the champion's corner, but could not hold back the throng and Leonard was forced to remain in the ring a quarter of an hour receiving congratulations.

Benton Harbor was unable to care for the tremendous crowd which jammed the little city to see the championship battle or for the city's usual summer attractions.

With a normal population of 15,000 it is estimated that 40,000 to 50,000 persons came to the resort for the week end. Thousands sought shelter in private homes parks and anywhere they could go.

White and Leonard were weighed privately at their respective camps by the officials of the Michigan Boxing Commission. Leonard's weight was announced at the ringside as 137 1-2, while White's weight was announced as 134. Leonard's weight was somewhat of a surprise as it was thought he was much heavier. The boys were weighed at 11 o'clock in the morning.

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24 PRISONERS SAW BARS AND ESCAPE

INDIANAPOLIS, July 5.—Twenty-four prisoners escaped from the county jail here early today, sawing out two bars. Six were captured. After laying the jailer unconscious on the floor with an iron bar, 24 walked leisurely out. They obtained the keys from the jailer's pocket and opened the door.

TOO WEAK TO DO ANYTHING

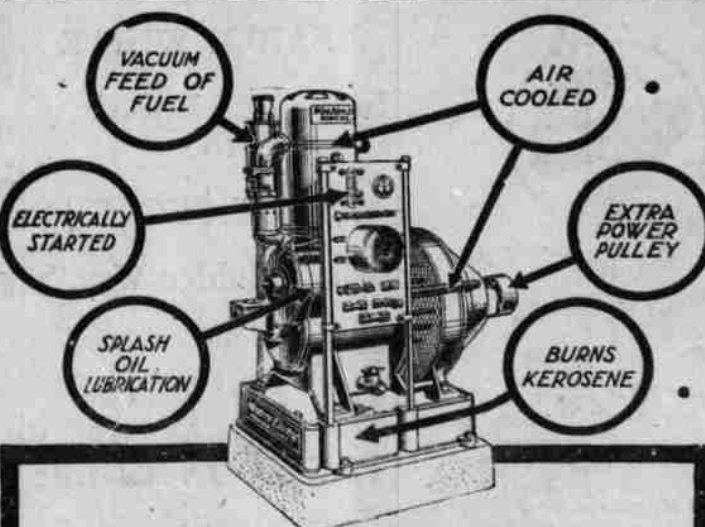
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BOB ROPER OUTPOINTS CHAMPION BOB MARTIN

AKRON, O., July 6.—Captain Bob Roper outpointed Bob Martin, champion of the American expedition forces, in a fast 12-round contest here Monday, according to ringside critics. Both tried hard for a knockout but neither was able to land the decisive blow.

Roper won chiefly because he repeatedly beat Martin to the punch. In the third he drew blood and from then on was hammering Martin in the face. Martin's body blows at times were almost terrific and Roper cautiously covered his midriff through most of the contest.

The first, fifth and 12th rounds were even. Martin had the advantage in the second, fourth and eighth but the other six were Roper's.

Roper's weight was announced at 181 1-4, Martin's 188 1-4.
