Water in River Falling.

Water in the Umatilla river is rapidly falling, according to County Watermaster A. E. Perry, and the river today is at as low a stage as at any time last summer, with prospects of going even lower he says. The users of water under the Furnish ditch, near Stanfield were without water yesterday owing to a break in the ditch which required cutting off the supply, but Mr. Perry says that the country there is not in danger of being without water for some time yet. He believes the break has been repaired and water again turned into the ditch.

EXPENDITURE PROBE REVEALS BIG CHASM

(By United Press.) CHICAGO, July 7.—The history of financing the Wood campaign for presidency was given the senate investigating committee today by William Loeb, Jr. Loeb said he was "depository" for \$400,000 collected for the Wood campaign. He sent \$225,000 to the Chicago headquarters for the general, he said, \$130,000 to eastern headquarters and \$45,000 to the New York headquarters. Later he sent a check for the balance of \$40,000 to Colonel Proctor, Wood's manager.

Major Sprague was asked by Senator Reed what had become of the difference between the \$300,000 Colorado leaders admitted receiving and \$14,000 reported to the committee as expended in that state. Sprague said he did not know. "There's a most remarkable dearth of information around the Wood headquarters," Reed interjected. "I know enough about campaigns to know someone around the headquarters knows what became of the money."

LIBERALS SCRATCH FOR PRESIDENTIAL TIMBER

CHAMBERLAIN (United Press Staff Correspondent) CHICAGO, July 7.—The third party presidential possibilities were increased by two when the names of Senator Owen and Eugene Debs were mentioned by the delegates arriving here. Added impetus was given the boom by Senator La Follette by the many delegates.

"There is no doubt who will be the candidate if La Follette will accept," said a South Dakota delegate. "But thus far he has remained silent."

Owen's name was given special significance when it was learned he was enroute here from San Francisco with Howard Williams, vice chairman of the executive committee of the committee of 48, and Frank Walsh, a member of the executive committee and the national labor party. "Owen was a populist before he was a democrat," liberals here said.

"He has a history of liberalism, and has been regarded as a very liberal democrat." That the national labor party committee will amalgamate to place a presidential ticket on the field is considered "practically certain."

Says Organization Certain. (By United Press.) SAN FRANCISCO, July 7.—A committee of 48 issued the following: "The result of the democratic convention makes the organization of a new political party a certainty. The republican convention adopted a reactionary platform and selected an old guard candidate. The people of the United States expected relief from the democratic convention.
