FOURTH OF JULY ENDS BASEBALL AND BOXING SEASON IN PENDLETON

Curtain Descends on League
and on Fights After Year of
Varying Success; Minor
Sports to Continue.

July Fourth brought to a close locally a season of baseball and boxing, successful artistically but none too much so financially. The holiday showed that fans have become a bit jaded with sports and are ready to pass the dog days in harvesting and mowing their crops.

The Blue Mountain baseball league, organized to do away with the dull Sundays, furnished a lot of sport in the county towns. There was some mighty good baseball during the season and some that was not so good. The league developed several stars in the smaller towns. Helix, smallest town in the league, produced what most fans consider the strongest nine.

First Basemen Shone
One of the outstanding features of play in the little league was the class of first basemen. Every one of the six men holding down the initial station played excellent ball all season and there were probably more stars on the first corner than at any other station. Duff, the long Milton soccer, probably outshone the others in a slight measure.

Shang Thorne, pitching for Helix, had the most success in the box and about all he had to do was throw his glove on the diamond and his opponents were beaten. Jordan, Milton pitcher, sailed through the season in good style also.

In the boxing game the American Legion here spent between \$5000 and \$7000 for its two smokers and gave the fans two cards as fast as anything put on in Portland last winter and spring. In the first event the legion was well supported but the holiday attendance proved something of a blower and the financial success of the affair went glimmering.

Fighters Cost Money
It is an ambitious undertaking to bring \$750 fighters to a town the size of Pendleton and the legion did so because the fans liked the work of those men when they worked here before. The local post has taken up a task no one else wanted, that of furnishing some red blooded boxing here, and expected to break even at least. The

boys probably will come back with one more smoker in the fall to test out sentiment. The opinion is that the boys want boxing but they want it when they want it and that does not mean on a holiday.

The church league has a little argument to settle this week and next, beginning with a game tonight at 8:15. Three teams are tied for the championship and they will play off for the title. After they settle their difference swimming and tennis will hold sway at Round-Up park and golf across the river, for the only sports of the summer.

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THREE ATHLETES AND OREGON TRAINER WILL TRY OUT FOR OLYMPIC

Hank Foster, Ken Bartlett and Arthur Tuck to Accompany Bill Hayward to Harvard for Final Selection.

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene, July 7.—Accompanied by Trainer Bill Hayward, Henry Foster of John Day, Oregon Kenneth Bartlett of Estacada, Oregon and Arthur Tuck of Redmond, Oregon, will leave July 8 to take part in the final tryouts at Harvard Stadium, Boston, July 17, for places on the team which will represent the United States at the Olympic games at Antwerp, Belgium. Two of the men, Foster in the broad jump, and Bartlett in the discus throw, hold the best record made in America this year.

Foster, a member of the class of 1920, will enter the 226 meter run and the broad jump. He was one of the men who took part in the preliminaries at Pasadena this month but did not qualify. He was accepted for the finals on account of his past records. Foster's record of 23 feet 10 inches was the best made in this country this year.

Bartlett, was also a member of this year's graduating class from the University. In the games at Pasadena he took first place in the discus, his record being 143 feet 10 inches. Arthur Tuck, who has just finished his first year in college, has entered the javelin contest and the decathlon. The latter consists of 10 events, javelin, discus, pole vault, 100 meter, 400 meter, 120 meter, high hurdles, broad jump, high jump and 1500 meter. Tuck distinguished himself in athletics when, as the only entrant from Redmond high school, he won first place for that school.

In the tryouts at Pasadena, Tuck won second place in the javelin throw but is capable of doing better, being hindered by a sore ankle at the time. At the last of the Olympic games, held in Stockholm, in 1912, Walter McCutchen was placed 11th in the finals for the 1500 meter. Martin Hawkins of Portland took second place in the high hurdles the same year. In 1908 Dan Kelly placed second in the broad jump. Kelly also holds the world's record for the 100 yard and 200 yard run.

CONCRETE POURING FOR NEW POOL WILL BEGIN

OREGON AGRICULTURE COLLEGE, Corvallis, July 7.—Workmen will soon be pouring concrete for the new swimming pool unit of the Men's gymnasium which is expected by R. B. Rutherford, new director of physical education for men and coach of intercollegiate athletics, to be one of the very finest in the country.

The pool itself will be 100 by 50 feet and equipped with lights in the bottom. A balcony will be provided with ample seating capacity.

Coach Rutherford is working on details in connection with the improvement of the athletic field. He hopes to make some decided changes in seating arrangement which will materially increase the capacity. Plans are also being considered for installing a 220 straightaway in the track.

VERNON TAKES FIRST PLACE IN COAST RACE
