Signs Will Be Painted.

Railroad crossings at Nolin, Barnhart, Mission, Cayuse, Thornhollow and Pendleton are to be painted. "Painter" Wendt has been awarded the contract and started work today.

Office to Be Enlarged.

The office at the Peoples Warehouse is to be enlarged and work on the improvements is now under way. The storeroom used formerly by the grocery department is to be converted into additional office quarters.

Coming With Big Fish.

"We have the biggest catch of eastern brook trout of the year," says Ed Baum in a night letter to the East Oregonian today from Joseph, Oregon, where he and W. D. Humphrey have been on a outing with their families during the week. They expect to return to Pendleton in time to show the catch all day Friday. The party last evening had just returned from Ice Horsehoe and Lee Lakes, 11,000 feet high. They enjoyed snow-balling in the Wallawa county mountains. The trip so far has been exceptional, he says.

Tainting East Court Street.

The block on East Court street between Thompson and College streets was painted today for center parking, in accordance with the ordinance which has been in effect several weeks. The block on Alta between Main and Cottonwood is being held up, it is said, because of objection from a business house there.

Baker Has More People.

While Pendleton has outstripped La Grande, according to the government census figures for Baker are reported to be 7739, which would give the city east of here 342 more than Pendleton. The claim of local officials for the largest town in Oregon east of Portland, therefore, is modified, when consideration is taken of the Baker census.

Weeds Must Go Is Edict.

The fire and street departments today combined forces to enforce the weed cutting ordinance in the city. Notices were sent out two weeks ago by the street department that all weeds must be cut and a large percentage of the local public responded. There are still a large number of lots with weeds uncut, the fire chief reported today, and these are drying so rapidly that they are a fire risk. He asks that these weeds be cut at once and that when they are burned the surrounding buildings be sprinkled so that sparks will not start a blaze. The street commissioner, in backing up the request of the fire department, de-

clared that those who refuse to cut their weeds within reasonable time will be brought before the recorder and fined, as provided in the ordinance.

Hay Adds to Celebration.

A conflagration that consumed 150 tons of hay on the William Slusher ranch at Nolin last Saturday night added more illumination to the sky than all the fireworks which were imported for the Nolin celebration. The origin of the hay fire is unknown but it is thought to have come from sparks from fireworks used at the celebration. The hay was the first cutting of alfalfa from the Slusher ranch.

Pig Club Meets.

Members of the Columbia pig club met yesterday for a conference in Columbia with Fred Bension, county agriculture agent. Those present were Frances Donaldson, Walter Norquist and Gilbert Whistett, who are raising market pigs, and Leroy Geisinger, William Waugeman, Pearl Geisinger and Leon Norquist, who are raising pure-bred Durocs. Mr. Bension says the pig enthusiasts are making excellent progress.

The manager declares that the accurately thrown rocks from the box of small boys are playing havoc with his street lighting system, and he has appealed to the police for relief. HARDING BEGINS REAL "WRITING OF ACCEPTANCE"

(By Associated Press)
MARION, O., July 8.—After several weeks spent in preliminary preparation, Senator Harding yesterday began the actual writing of his speech to be delivered on July 22, accepting the republican presidential nomination. He expects to complete it in about 10 days during which time he plans to see his visitors. The announcement made by Senator Johnson of California, that he would support the republican ticket greatly pleased Senator Harding when informed of it yesterday. The statement did not come as a surprise, however.

"I am glad Senator Johnson is going to give the ticket his support,"

the republican nominee said. "I am glad to know of everybody's support," he added. "and I would much rather have support on that grounds than our platform is appealing than on the grounds of interest in the nominee."

Senator Harding added that throughout the campaign he intended to emphasize "interest in party."

"It's going to be a bid in the campaign," said the Ohio senator.
