FOUR REPUBLICANS AND FOUR DEMOCRATS ON VISITING PARTY

Members of the Pendleton committee that will cooperate with west end folk in presenting the needs of this district to the houses appropriations committee on Friday will make the trip to Hermiston on the early morning train, returning home in the evening on the train that will bring the congressional party's special car to Pendleton.

During the day the congressmen will be shown about the Umatilla project, the itinerary including trips to both the Lane reservoir and the Cold Springs reservoir. The finale will occur at Stanfield where a lunch will be served at the Paige ranch. The committee will entrain at Stanfield.

PRISONER EXCHANGE ON IN FULL SWING

BERLIN, July 13.—Exchange of prisoners between Germany and Russia is on in full swing. Conclusion of an agreement between the German and soviet governments made this possible, but now as a result of the agreement the soviet representative here, Wigdor Kopp, contends that Germany has recognized sovietism as the de facto government. He points to the text of the treaty made between the "German government" and the "Russian soviet government" as proof of his claim.

The hope of the Soviets that the prisoner agreement would quickly lead to a wider agreement, namely a business treaty has not been fulfilled, and the indications are that it will not be consummated for some time to come. In fact, the foreign office let it be known that it doubts Russia's claims as to ability to deliver goods, while in a recent speech in the Bavarian parliament Secretary von Mueller of Bavaria declared that the Russian claims were exaggerated and her transportation situation such that she could not be a trade factor.

Meantime, Kopp says on in Berlin. In fact he operates quite openly as the German government considers him an accredited agent and he now has offices in Unter den Linden.

Many persons foresee the possibility that ultimately Germany—not England or any other power—will be the one to exploit Russia. Japan is constantly making friendly statements about Germany, and some observers consider these as the forerunner of an eventual agreement between the Nipponese and the Teutons wherein Germany will exploit Russia and Japan will exploit China.

For the present, however, there remains only a possibility. Germany is in no position to undertake any extensive business in Russia now, but Germany has always had strong representation in Russia and her business men know Russia, her language, customs and people.

NOTICE OF STREET IMPROVEMENT

Notice is hereby given that at a regular meeting of The Common Council of The City of Pendleton held at the Council Chambers in Pendleton Oregon, on July 7th 1920 the following Resolution was duly adopted:

WHEREAS, The City Surveyor of The City of Pendleton did on the 30th day of June, 1920, under directions and by requirement of the Common Council file in the office of the Re-

order of The City of Pendleton, plans and specifications for an appropriate improvement of the following named street in said city:

Garfield Street from the North line of Jackson street to the South line of Martin Street, together with the estimates of the work to be done, and the probable cost thereof with a statement of the lots, parts of lots and parcels of land to be benefited by such improvement and the percentage of the total cost of improvement, which each of such lots, parts of lots and parcels of land should pay on account of the benefits to be derived from such improvement, and,

WHEREAS, the council has examined such plans and specifications and estimates and found the same satisfactory and the estimates therefor to be in accordance with the probable cost of such work, and,

WHEREAS, the property recommended by the City Surveyor to be included within the boundaries of the district benefited is in the judgement of the Common Council properly to be included within such improvement District and no property is excluded therefrom which should properly be included therein; and,

WHEREAS the improvement of the hereinabove described portions of Garfield Street either gravel Bitulithic pavement, Concrete pavement or Warrentite Bitulithic pavement on Crushed rock or crushed gravel foundation is at this time necessary, therefore, be it,

RESOLVED by the Common Council of The City of Pendleton that it is expedient to improve and it is hereby proposed to improve said portion of Garfield street by paving the same with either gravel Bitulithic pavement Concrete pavement of Warrentite Bitulithic pavement on Crushed rock or Crushed gravel foundation; such pavement to be constructed and the surface thereof to be finished upon the established grade of said street and the street to have curbs and gutters and all other things in accordance with and as shown in the plans and specifications for the improvement of said portions of said Garfield Street, prepared by P. B. Hayes, City Surveyor, filed with the Recorder of said city on the 30th day of June, 1920, which said plans and specifications are hereby particularly referred to, and be it further

RESOLVED that the Engineer's estimates of the probable total cost of such improvement, which said City Engineer's estimates was made and prepared by P. B. Hayes, City Surveyor, or of said city, in the sum of \$14,324.05 and was filed with the Recorder of said city on the 30th day of June, 1920, is hereby included and hereby referred to particularly; and be it further

RESOLVED that the plans and specifications and estimates for such improvement as prepared by the City Surveyor and filed with the Recorder of The City of Pendleton on the 30th day of June, 1920, be and they are hereby adapted and approved, and be it further

RESOLVED that the cost of making such improvement shall be a charge and lien upon all lots, parts of lots and parcels of land to be benefited by such improvement, and the owners of such lots, parts of lots and parcels of land so specially benefited by such improvement shall be liable for the payment of the costs thereof, and be it further,

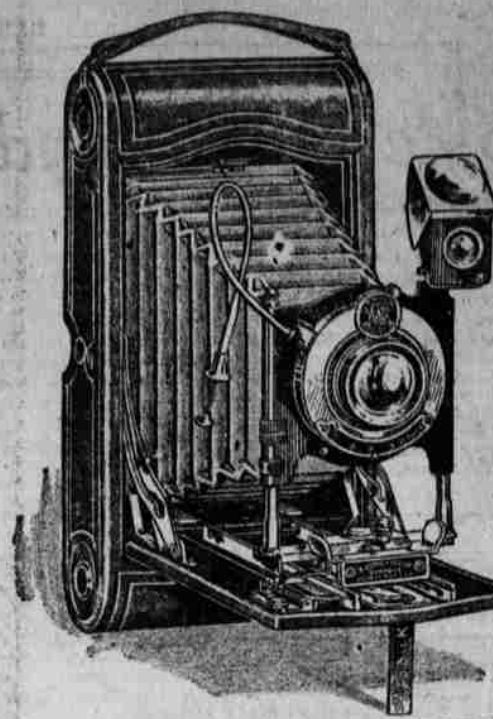
RESOLVED that an Assessment District is hereby created to be known as "Assessment District No. 68" embracing the property benefited and to be assessed for the payment of such improvement, which Assessment District shall include all lots, parts of lots and parcels of land lying and being within the district bounded and described as follows, to-wit:

Description of Assessment District No. 68.
Commencing on the Southwest corner of Lot 6, Block 3, Livermore's Add. to Pendleton, Oregon, thence North and parallel with the West line of Garfield Street 1920 feet; thence East and along the South line of Martin Street 260 feet; thence South and parallel with the East line of Garfield Street 1020 feet; thence West along the North line of Jackson Street 260 feet to the point of beginning.

And be it further
RESOLVED, that a copy of this resolution together with the notice that the surveyor's estimate of the proportion of the cost of said work to be charged against each lot, part of lot and parcel of land is on file in the office of the City Recorder, be published for a period of ten days in the East Oregonian, which newspaper is hereby designated by the Common Council for the publication thereof.

And further notice is hereby given that the Surveyors estimate of the proportion of the cost of said work to be charged against each Lot, part of Lot, and parcel of Land on account of said work is now on file in the office of the City Recorder, subject to inspection and examination.
