CUP THAT OLD CRAFT WON IN 1851 IS YET HELD BY AMERICANS

Race This Month Between Sir Thomas Lipton's Shamrock and Yankee Resolute Recalls Original Contest.

BY HENRY L. FAIRHILL (United Press Staff Correspondent.) NEW YORK, July 13.—She was a freak. The London papers called her a "sparrow-hawk" and the natives called her as a "Yankee trick."



But she was some boat, the "America" was, and the cup she won in 1851 off the Isle of Wight still remains in America, emblematic of yacht supremacy, a testimonial of generation after generation of good builders and expert sailors.

Her trials were not impressive. She was beaten several times by the Maria, a famous sloop of that day.

On June 21, 1851, she sailed for England with a crew of thirteen including among them, Captain Dick Brown, Mate Nedie Colcock, six good sailors, a steward and a cook.

They had a good passage of 29 days to Havre, France, and had one day's record run of 284 miles. After being refitted and overhauled she sailed July 31, 1851, for Cowes, Isle of Wight.

The speed of the America in a tilt with the British cutter, Lynceus, made the English yachtsmen fearful of her power and the Americans had the greatest difficulty in arranging a match. George L. Schuyler, one of the syndicate of owners, posted a challenge to any British vessel whatever.

for any sum from 1000 to 10,000 guineas merely stipulating there should not be less than six-knot breeze. Robert Stephenson offered to match his schooner Titania against the America for a race of twenty miles to windward and return for 500 pounds. This offer was accepted and August 28, fixed for the date of the match.

In the meantime the Royal Yacht Squadron notified the Americans that there would be a regular open regatta of their club around the Isle of Wight on August 22 and that the America would be welcomed. The race was for a trophy valued at 100 guineas. On August 22, the America lined up with fourteen British vessels for the race.

The America was slow with her sails and was the last to get away at 10 a. m. from an anchor start. At the twelfth mile, the America had swept through the field until she was fifth behind the Beatrice, the Aurora, the Volant and the Arrow. The America took the lead at the St. Catherine's but had trouble with the tide and was nearly overtaken by the swift little Aurora. Rounding the Needles at 5:40 p. m., it was estimated the America had a lead of eight miles on the field. Here with the wind falling light again and the tide strong, the Aurora gained and was only two miles astern at the finish. The America finished at 8:24 p. m.; the Aurora at 8:58, the Beatrice at 9:20, the Eclipse at 9:45 and the Brilliant at 1:20 a. m.

The British said the America was a "mere shell" and called her "a Yankee trick."

They said: "We'll build a boat in 99 days that will beat America for 600 pounds."

The Yanks answered: "Make it 25,000 pounds and we'll wait and sail the race."

A week after, the America sailed her match with the Titania from the Nab lightship to the Isle of Wight. The foremast of the America was carried away at the start but repairs were made and she won with an hour to spare.

The Americans were unable to match her for any more race and rather than sail her home, her owners sold her to Lord John de Blaquiere for \$25,000. After being radically changed and altered she was raced with indifferent success and was finally sold to General Benjamin T. Butler of Massachusetts, in whose family she still remains.

SWIMMER SPRINGS SURPRISE IN TRYOUT

CHICAGO, July 12.—Ray Kegeris of the Los Angeles Athletic Club, a swimmer virtually unknown to the eastern swimming world, sprung a surprise in the national Olympic swimming tryouts in the Lincoln Park Lagoon today by winning the 100 meter back stroke. Kegeris stroked the distance in 1:22 3-5, two and one fifth seconds slower than the Olympic record held by Harry Henner of the Illinois Athletic Club. W. Kealoha of Hawaii was second and H. H. Gruger of Hawaii third.

U. S. FLYER WITH POLISH ARMY MAKES THRILLING ESCAPE

(By Associated Press.) WITH THE POLISH ARMY AT THE FRONT, July 12.—Lieutenant Herman C. Robinson of Wilmington, N. C., a pilot in the Kosciuszko squadron of American flyers with the Polish army, who was shot down within Bolshevik lines recently, managed to escape by posing as an Austrian on his way home after imprisonment in Siberia. Lieutenant Robinson was 20 miles from the Polish lines when he attacked a Bolshevik infantry detachment, the reds replying with rifles and machine guns, one bullet piercing the gasoline tank of his airplane. Realizing that it would be impossible to reach the Polish front he flew as far as possible, making a safe landing, but near Bolshevik troops. He escaped into the heavy underbrush with which the Ukraine in this part of the fighting front is carpeted and, after two days and nights, reached headquarters of the squadron. The airplane was recovered later by a Polish cavalry unit and mechanics of the squadron.
