LIBERAL FACTIONS TO HOLD YAKIMA SESSION

SEATTLE, Wash., July 14.—(A.P.)—Railway men who will participate in the Yakima conferences between the triple alliance, non-partisan league, committee for 48, private soldiers and sailors legion, railwaymen's welfare league and such other political organizations as seek recognition will organize in Yakima Sunday for the convention work that is planned to start Monday morning. The leaders will go to Yakima Saturday. W. M. Short, president of the state federation of labor, will close his speaking tour at Ephrata Saturday night and will probably motor to Yakima Sunday to get in touch with other leaders expected there that day. The railroad men, it is understood are going to demand that they be given a candidate for congress. A temporary slate has been submitted it is stated headed by Forest L. Hudson for United States Senator.

CALIFORNIA FLYERS CAN LEARN WEATHER SIX MONTHS AHEAD

LOS ANGELES, July 14.—Aviators wishing to fly over Southern California may secure information regarding air currents at least six months in advance to guide them in determining at what altitude they should fly. This is the statement of Dr. Ford A. Carpenter, formerly of the United States Weather Bureau, now manager of the department of meteorology and aeronautics of the Los Angeles Chamber of Commerce. The department of which Dr. Carpenter is the head furnishes information daily to aviators with regard to general flying conditions. The data thus supplied is based upon Dr. Carpenter's personal observations in this section, covering a period of more than 20 years; United States weather bureau reports and telephonic communications from various California points.

Fly With Current. "Should an aviator ask which route to take in flying north," Dr. Carpenter said when explaining his system, "we would telephonate certain points in the mountain passes of the Tehachepi range. The wind might be sweeping north through one pass and south through another. Of course, we would advise the aviator to follow the pass where the wind was to the north. "A few months ago a United States army officer asked if it would be safe for his airplanes to take off for San Francisco at 3 o'clock on a stormy morning. After consulting the weather bureau we felt safe in advising him that if he started at that time he would strike fair weather in an hour, which proved to be the case. **Conditions are Stable.** "Air currents come so near to being without deviation in Southern California that we can make a statement regarding conditions likely to prevail at any time of the year at any point. This was demonstrated recently when

a trip was made in a free balloon from the campus of the University of California, southern branch, to Highland Park in the northern section of Los Angeles. Every detail of the flight was planned six months in advance, even to the time and place of starting and landing. "A manufacturing concern recently asked whether it would be possible to make trial flights of 'baby blimps' at a certain time at Los Angeles harbor. Our records showed the wind would be unfavorable, but that nearly ideal conditions could be found at that time four miles up the coast."
