### FOREST FIRE FIGHTING ENTAILS MAMMOTH COST

HELSOLA, Mont., July 14.—(By A. P.)—Equipment and supplies for fire-fighters in the government forests of federal forest service district No. 1, comprising Montana and northern Idaho, have been sent out from district headquarters here to forest supervisors, against the forest fire season. An inventory made a few weeks ago showed equipment and supplies worth here to a value of more than half a million dollars.

The size of the task of preparation for the fire season is indicated by the fact that the warehouse here contains this spring 17,000 blankets, 3,000 "rolled beds," 73 sets of equipment for 25 men each and numerous outfits for crews of smaller size down to two men, and other articles in proportion.

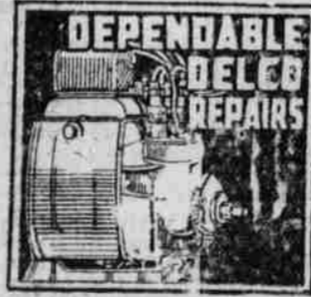
