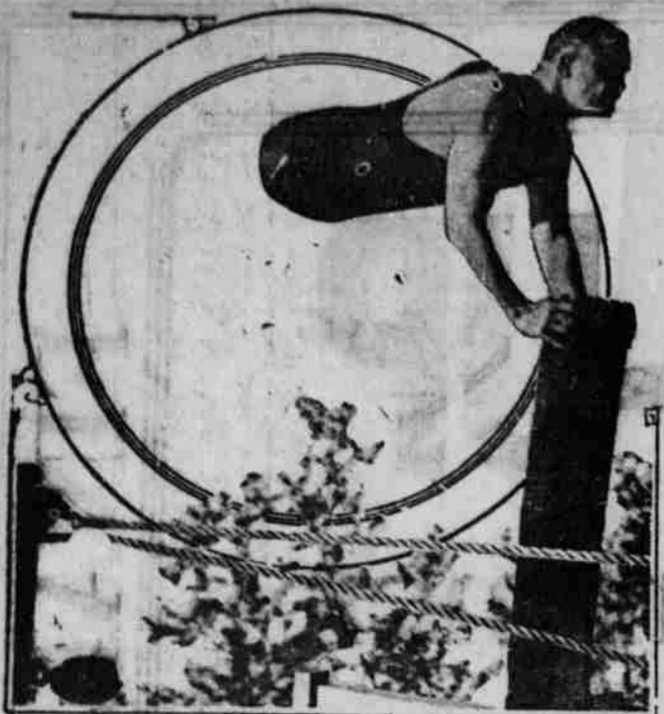


THE INVINCIBLE VETERAN

In 1910 he gave 20,000 to Cambridge university for the foundation of the King Edward VII Chair of English Literature, and in 1918 he gave a similar sum to Cambridge as the Harmsworth Professorship of Naval History, in memory of his second son, who was killed in the battle of the Ancre.

LIPTON SAYS VICTORY WAS EARNED IN FLUKE

ABOARD STEAM YACHT VICTORIA. (By Wireless to The Associated Press) July 16.—A victory that was not earned is the way Sir Thomas Lipton, owner of the challenger, summed up yesterday's race. "I am exceedingly sorry the Shamrock won through a fluke," he said, "and I would much prefer not to accept the race. I am convinced by my friends, however, that such a course would not be for the best interests of yachting and that it would tend to set a precedent whereby a premium could be placed on faulty or slight construction."
"I lost a race myself," he added, "through a fluke—the breaking of a sail, and I know that the American people sympathized with me. I can say positively that it is not pleasure or glory for me to win a race through a fluke. With a good steady breeze Saturday, I am convinced that Shamrock will come out a winner."
Sir Thomas viewed the race from the steam yacht Victoria, chartered by him for the occasion.
The victory gave him no feeling of exultation. He accepted congratulations tendered him but his interest in the prospects of the next race and his confidence in Shamrock for future showings was far more marked than was his interest in the result of the first day's race.

WOMAN SUFFRAGE FOR MEXICO IS PREDICTED

MEXICO CITY, July 16.—(A. P.)—Woman suffrage in Mexico in the near future was predicted by Provisional President Adolfo de la Huerta at a conference with the teachers and students of a woman's school here, according to E. Democrats.
The young women who today vote for the directress of her school, tomorrow will vote for her public officers, the provisional President is quoted as having told the delegation, which called on him for permission to select a head for the school in case the present directress were removed.
The request made by the young women showed that Mexico's womanhood is beginning to prepare for the ballot, Señor de la Huerta said. He granted the privileges asked for on condition that the women would choose

OXFORD IS GIVEN U. S. PROFESSORSHIP

LONDON, July 16.—(A. P.)—Viscount Rothermere has given the University of Oxford 29,000 pounds for the establishment and endowment of a professorship of history of the United States of America, which will be known as the Harold Vyvyan Harmsworth Professorship of American History, in memory of his son, Captain Harold Vyvyan Harmsworth, of the Irish Guards, formerly a chaplain of Christ Church, who was killed in the war.
Under the conditions of the endowment the holder of the professorship must at the time of his election be a citizen of the United States. He shall hold the professorship for 10 years, and shall be eligible for appointment for another 10 years.
The appointment shall be made by an electoral board consisting of the American ambassador at the time of the election, who shall have a casting vote, the chancellor of the university,

HONOLULU WILL LOOK TO ENCIRCLING OCEAN FOR NEWS OF WEATHER

HONOLULU, T. H. July 16.—(A. P.)—Honolulu's weather bureau in future will gather statistics from the surrounding ocean from which to draft forecasts of weather in the islands, according to an announcement by L. H. Daingerfield, meteorologist in charge.
Daingerfield has distributed to ship masters, owners and agents requests for cooperation in reporting weather conditions at sea. Forecasts from the local office will be based on these as they are received through the navy's radio stations.

LAST CHINESE LEAVES CALIFORNIA TOWN

HEALDSBURG, Cal., July 16.—(A. P.)—The city's last Chinese has left town. In former years Healdsburg had quite a Chinese population, and a whole row of Chinese merchants, laundries, and chop houses existed in the early days. Tom Cheun, proprietor of a local restaurant for the past twenty years, this week sold out and has left town.
Several years ago Cheun cut a wide swath for a few brief weeks, having married a white woman, an adventuress, who went through his financial accumulation of years and then disappeared. Cheun was thoroughly Americanized, and was known for his charitable gifts.
