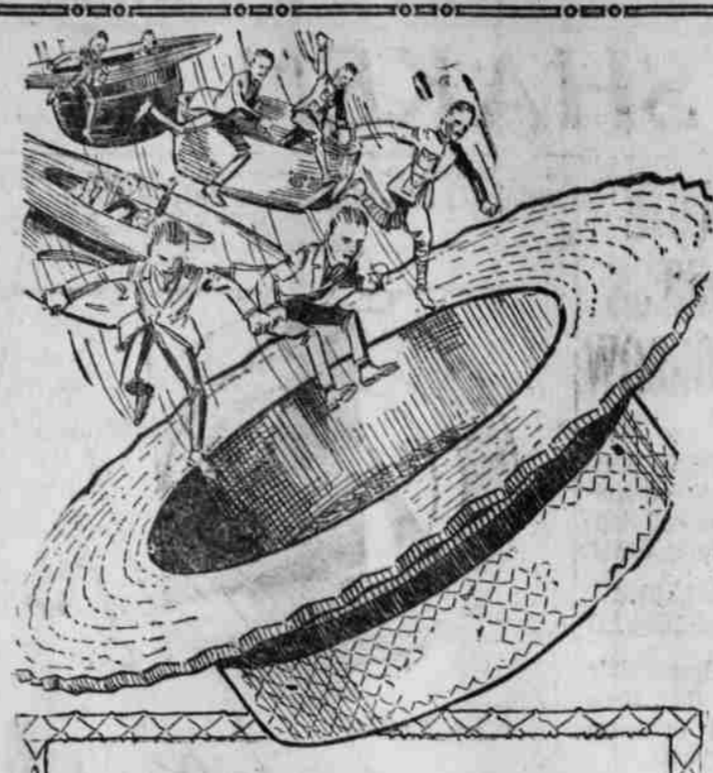

## FOUR ARE WINNERS OF GOLF CHAMPIONSHIP

MEMPHIS, Tenn., July 16.—(A. P.)—Charles Evans, Jr., of Chicago, "Bobby" Jones, Jr., of Atlanta, Henry Wentzler, Memphis, and Clarence Wolff, St. Louis are the four survivors in the amateur championship tournament of the western Golf Association, which enters the semi-finals stage tomorrow with Jones opposing Evans, and Wentzler battling Wolff for a place in Saturday's final.  
Evans eliminated James Ward, Kansas City, in the third round yesterday of match play, five and four; Jones ousted Clarence Hubby, Jr., of Dallas Texas, 12 to 11; Wentzler defeated Bert Wilber of Indianapolis, 5 and 5, and Wolff defeated Polak Boyd of Chattanooga, 2 to 1.  
The third round matches were over a test of 36 holes. The semifinals and finals are to be of similar distance.

## MARSHFIELD ELKS WILL BE STRONG CONTENDERS FOR 1921 CONVENTION

SALEM, Or., July 16.—The Marshfield delegation of Elks, coming in a train of six special coaches, is going to be a strong contender for the 1921 session of the Oregon Elks when the question comes to a vote at the third annual convention, to be held in this city July 22-24.  
The antlered brethren of three other cities are also slated to come in special trains, according to word received here, and it is expected that the Eastern Oregon contingent will have at least one and possibly two specials.  
Astoria and Roseburg are likewise sending delegations too large to be accommodated on regular passenger trains.  
Aside from the Portland delegation, which is to consist of 1400 Elks headed by their own 45-piece band, the McMinnville lodge will have one of the largest representations and will maintain separate headquarters here throughout the convention.

**HONOLULU CLUBS UNITE**  
HONOLULU, T. H., July 14.—(A. P.)—Women's clubs of Honolulu will unite in a federation to gain the strength that comes from union, according to a decision of a meeting of delegates from almost every women's

organization in the city which was held recently. A committee was formed to draft a constitution, which, it is expected, will follow closely the lines of the San Francisco federation.

## REED FOR DEMOCRATS DESPITE CONTROVERSY

ST. JOSEPH, Mo., July 16.—(A. P.)—Reiterating his opposition to the covenant of the league of nations as it is now framed and declaring that he will not recede one inch from the position, he has previously taken, Senator James A. Reed of Missouri, addressing a meeting here tonight declared that he intended to support the democratic candidates in the coming election, notwithstanding the declarations of the party in regard to the league of nations.  
"I intend to support the democratic candidates," Senator Reed asserted, "because the great principles of the democratic party which have survived the vicissitudes of the century still live."  
"Upon the league of nations, the platform of neither party suits me, but there is something greater than the platform of a political convention. It is the platform of Americanism. That platform was proclaimed in the declaration of independence. It was baptized in the blood of the revolution. It was formulated by George Washington."

## GASOLINE PRICE GOES FROM 32 TO 36 CENTS

An increase of four cents a gallon in the price of gasoline, bringing the price up from 32 to 36 cents a gallon, and an increase of five and a half cents in the price of kerosene, of which the average price is now 39 cents, was announced today by E. T. Vivian, head of the Standard Oil plant.  
As given by the company, the reason for the raise is the fact that while the entire Portland field is normally supplied from California, owing to the acute shortage existing in that state in the production of gas, it has been impossible to supply the needs of this district (the stations in the Portland field east of the Cascades, including Pendleton) from California. The

gas and kerosene (Pearl) is now purchased by the Standard Oil Co. from refineries in Wyoming and Utah and the new price is based on the higher cost of the product obtained in order to place a normal supply in the district.  
Refiners, the company states, give

every assurance they will supply sufficient gasoline and kerosene to meet the full demand, contingent however, on uninterrupted transportation conditions and an adequate supply of tank cars.
