Cash Wood Returns.

The school was one of the eight similar summer schools conducted by the Y. M. C. A. in the United States. About 250 attended. Pendleton Remains Fourth.
Pendleton still holds fourth place in the list of banks in the state having deposits over \$1,000,000, according to a report just issued by Will H. Bennett, state superintendent of banks. Pendleton has deposits of \$7,874,447.76, and is exceeded by Portland, Salem and Astoria. Milton, including the Freewater branch of the First National Bank of Milton, has \$1,151,682.28 deposits and is twenty-eighth in the list. Total deposits in the state says the report, aggregated \$289,275,542.92, a decrease of \$8,292,345.62 since May 4, 1920, but an increase of \$44,929,835.25 since June 30, 1919.

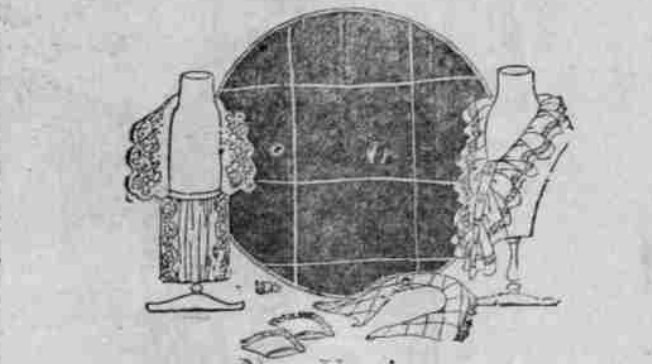

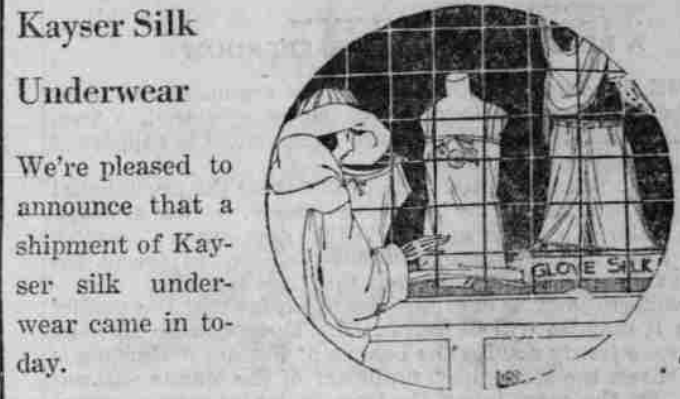

The Turks fled in a panic, throwing their arms and abandoning signs and ammunition.
