The plan of the club is to give the director employed by the school additional work as director for the club. The club has some 125 members and hopes to have classes for both men and women in fall and winter.

Samples Are Collected

The office of Fred Bennion, county agent, resembles a miniature wheat field since the collection of wheat samples by Mr. Bennion. Included are samples of Marquis, Marquis, Turkey Red, White Hybrid, etc. Mr. Bennion will leave for Athena this afternoon to collect more samples and will go to Hermiston and Stanfield tomorrow on a similar errand. Mr. Bennion states that harvest is becoming more general and he wishes to secure samples at this time.

Bids Will Be Opened

Bids for 12.8 miles of rock surfacing of the Cabbage Hill-Deadman's Pass section and 24,000 cubic yards of surfacing in this county will be opened by the state highway commission at its next meeting, August 10. Also of interest to Umatilla county is the announcement that bids will be opened for work on the John Day highway. The bids will be for five wood bridges on the John Day river highway requiring approximately 715 cubic yards excavation, fifteen cubic yards class "A" concrete, 345 cubic yards class "A" concrete, 6400 pounds metal reinforcing, 224 linear feet wood trestle, four forty-foot wooden truss spans and two 195-foot wooden truss spans.

Few Call For Medals

Only a few Umatilla county ex-service men have made application for the victory medal, according to word from the army recruiting office in Portland. The applications have been coming in so slowly that army officials believe the majority of the men who are entitled to these medals do not understand how to apply for them. Application should be made to the nearest recruiting station, according to an announcement from the war department, where the proper forms are available. Discharge papers should be shown to the recruiting officer in making the application. A victory medal with battle clasps is issued to troops participating in major engagements.

State Had No Money

The state has no authority to offer a reward for the capture of the murderers of Sheriff T. H. Taylor, according to Dr. R. E. L. Steiner, who was in the city yesterday, representing the governor. Dr. Steiner says that when the news of the tragedy reached Salem, Governor Olcott immediately conferred with Attorney General Brown, in the hope that arrangements could be made to offer a reward. Attorney General Brown stated that a reward could be made if the legislature appropriated the money. In this case, says Dr. Steiner, the only way in which a reward could be offered by the state would be to pledge that the legislature would make such an appropriation at its next session.

Umatilla County Gets Funds

The sum of \$22,184.60 was yesterday apportioned to Umatilla county as its share of a total of \$266,099.72, representing funds derived from the market road tax bill which was approved by the voters at the special election held June 2, 1919. Umatilla county's share is second only to that of Multnomah county, which received \$49,521.77. The amount disbursed represents funds received from the 1-mill tax levied on all assessable property in the state for market roads for the first six months' taxpaying period of 1920. Each county receives an amount at least equal to its contribution, but no county can receive in excess of 19 per cent of the total amount raised in that county in any one year. In order for any county to participate in the distribution of this fund, it is required to provide uniform levy on all taxable property of the county for market road construction, such an amount as may equal the amount apportioned to said county by the state highway commission.

DAYTON PLANS GREAT COX DEMONSTRATION

DAYTON, July 28.—(A. P.)—A big non-partisan celebration to honor the most distinguished son of Miami valley—Governor Cox—will be held here Friday. Republicans and democrats have joined to make the day one of the biggest of Dayton's history. Every effort is being made to outdo the homecoming reception of Harding by the city that is a political rival of Dayton. Factories and business establishments will declare a half holiday. The governor will review a parade of ten thousand. Twelve airplanes will fly over the city, bring a thousand aerial bombs.

SPOKANE, Wash., July 28.—(A. P.)—Plans for a bonus system in the logging camps and lumber mills of the Inland Empire are being considered by the Loyal Legion of Loggers and Lumbermen. It was announced here today by Norman F. Coleman, president of the legion.

The proposition was discussed at a meeting here yesterday of representatives of local organizations of this district, he said, and a committee was named to investigate the plan and report to the board of directors of the legion.

Co-operative stores also were discussed as a means of defeating the high cost of living and discouraging "drifting" of employees in the lumber industry.
