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SEVEN STARTS MADE BY SLOOPS IN RACES FOR AMERICA'S CUP

**Shamrock IV, Challenger, Took
First Two Contests Before
Resolute, Defender, Came
Back for Title Victories.**

SANDY HOOK, July 22.—(A. P.)—A summary of the 1920 series for America's cup follows:

First Race
First race won by Shamrock IV, Thursday July 15; fifteen miles to windward and return, in light southwest wind. Resolute's throat halyards parted, dropping her gaff and letting her main sail down as she was about to round the 15 mile turn a mile ahead of Shamrock. Resolute withdrew, Shamrock finishing in 4:25:12, elapsed time.

Second Race
Second race called off Saturday July 17, after yachts failed to cover a thirty mile triangle in light wind within the six hour limit. Resolute was a half hour ahead.

Third Race
Third race re-called Tuesday July 20, won by Shamrock. Thirty mile triangular course. Shamrock won by nine minutes, 21 seconds, elapsed time two minutes, 26 seconds corrected time.

Fourth Race
Fourth race, Wednesday July 21, won by Resolute over windward and leeward course in light southwest winds. Each boat took four hours 2 minutes and 6 seconds. Resolute won by her time allowance 7 minutes, 1 second.

Fifth Race
Fifth race, Friday July 23, won by Resolute, over 30 mile triangular course in actually weather. Resolute won by 3 minutes, 15 seconds, elapsed time, nine minutes, 55 seconds, corrected time.

Sixth Race
Sixth race postponed Saturday July 24 because of 25-mile southwest. July 26, after yachts failed to cover 30 mile windward and leeward course within limit.

Seventh Race
Seventh race, Tuesday, July 27, won by Resolute over a windward and leeward course in light southwest wind. Resolute won by 12 minutes, five seconds elapsed time, 19 minutes, 45 seconds corrected time.

NEW YORK, July 29.—(A. P.)—For the 12th time since inauguration of international yachting contests a

half century ago, a British challenger has been defeated by a Yankee defender of the America's cup, the perpetual trophy named for the schooner yacht America, which won the first race from Great Britain in 1851.

Before Shamrock IV, 12 challengers strove in vain for the hundred guinea pewter mug, which has been in the custody of the New York Yacht club continuously.

Only twice prior to 1920 had a challenger crossed the finish line ahead of the defender. On September 10, 1895, Valkyrie III, finished 1 minute and 16 seconds ahead of the American boat but withdrew and on October 4, 1901, Shamrock II finished two seconds ahead of Columbia but lost because of a 42 second time allowance.

Race Over 30 Mile Course.
It was a 30 mile windward and leeward race, started in light air after postponement at 15 minute intervals for two hours and a quarter. After having been led by the challenger for two thirds of the distance to the first mark, a windward leg, Resolute crossed her bows 10 miles from the start and breezed into a lead which she maintained and steadily increased. By the time 22 miles had been covered, the defender was a mile and a half in the lead reaching back and forth on her way to the finish line.

At one time toward the end she was 2 miles ahead of Shamrock but the challenger came up to within a mile at the finish.

While waiting for Shamrock to finish the steam yacht Victoria ran down to Resolute and all hands, led by Sir Thomas Lipton gave the victors three cheers.

The spectators' fleet gave the defender such a noisy welcome as she crossed the line that it could be heard ten miles away on shore.

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FAVORITES FARE ILLY ON SECOND DAY CARD GRAND CIRCUIT RACE

**Royal Palm, Jane Volo and
Charley Rex, Looked Upon
as Sure Winners, Gave Way
to Third Placers in Events.**

COLUMBUS, O., July 23.—(A. P.)—Favorites did not fare well Tuesday on the second afternoon's card of the Grand Circuit meet. There also was some woe connected with the "upsets" in the Shepard and Swisher 2:11 trot, purse \$5000, the feature event.

Royal Palm, heavy favorite in the auction, once selling for \$400 in a ticket totalling \$1135, made a break at the half mile in the first heat and was distanced. Millie Irwin, a third choice won the heat from the 15 starters. Alta Donovan won the second heat. As she slacked up after passing the wire, she cut her tendons in the left front leg severely and had to be drawn. Millie Irwin then won the third heat and the race. Alta Donovan will be unable to race again this year. Best time 2:06 1-4.

Favonian won the 2:20 trot for 2-year-olds in straight heats. Jane Volo, original favorite, being forced to accept third money. Best time 2:19 1-4.

George Volo, second choice, defeated a good field in the 2:16 pace in straight heats, including Hazel Kuerstner, a well played favorite. Best time 2:05 1-4.

Charley Rex Made one of his weird breaks in the first heat of the 2:05 trot, the Neil House stake. He finished last, Don de Lopez winning the heat.

Baron Cegantle slipped through and paid \$59.60 on a \$2 mutual ticket as he won the second heat from Charley Rex, who then won the third mile. In the fourth heat Baron Cegantle captured the deciding heat and the race. Best time 2:02 1-4.

BEAVERS TAKE TIGHT CONTEST FROM FRISCO

PORTLAND, July 23.—(The Beavers) celebrated their return home by winning a tight contest from San Francisco 4 to 3 yesterday afternoon. The Beavers got their three runs in the fourth inning, the Beavers coming right back with two in their half and putting the game on ice with two more in the fifth. Brooks and Lewis, opposing twirlers, were each touched up for six hits.

Senators Pull Out of Cellar.
SAN FRANCISCO, July 23.—(A. P.)—San Francisco emerged from the cellar by defeating Oakland 9 to 3. The Senators put the game in cold storage in the fifth when, with a two run lead already established they scored five times on three doubles, three singles, furthered by Lane's error.

Vernon Wins in Ninth.
LOS ANGELES, July 23.—(A. P.)—A ninth inning rally gave Vernon victory over Salt Lake, 5 to 4. The Tigers hit hard on Chullop in that inning and converted four hits into three runs.

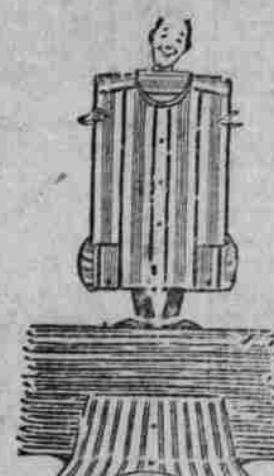
OREGON SIGNS U. S. C. FOR PASADENA CONTEST

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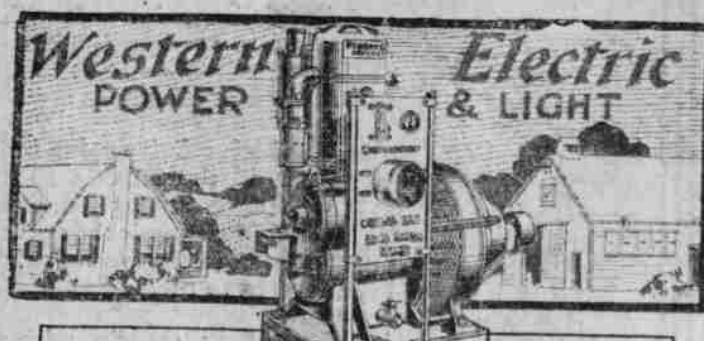
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
