FOREIGN SITUATION AFFECTS STOCK SALES

(From Overbeck & Cooke Co.)

NEW YORK, July 29.—There was alternate periods of weakness and strength although the tone of the market at the close was heavy and declines for the day were registered in many issues. There seemed to be a free supply of call money in circulation today but did not alter the desire of some holders of stocks to reduce commitments. Shorts covered freely at times and 'his buying seemed to represent in great part the bulk of the support. The news from abroad regarding the Polish situation in certain important territories was, if anything, more disturbing and quite naturally served to increase apprehension over the status of things in Europe. Particular emphasis should be placed on the unsatisfactory affairs prevailing over a large portion of European territory and until advice from over seas are of a more reassuring sort it may be well to exercise caution in following the buying side of the market.

CHURCH WORKERS PUT BLAME ON STEEL TRUST

NEW YORK, July 29.—(U. P.)—Another strike in the steel industry is inevitable unless vital changes are made in the administration of that industry, according to a report of the interchurch world movement on the recent coal strike, made public here. A copy of the report was sent to President Wilson, with a letter recommending that a special commission be charged with immediately effecting a free and open conference between employers and employees of the steel industry. The report declared charges of bolshevism in the steel strike are unfounded, that half the employees of the United States steel corporation are still working 12 hours a day. Other findings included charges that in the last ten years the workers daily hours have been lengthened, instead of shortened; the bulk of unskilled labor earned less than enough for the average family's minimum subsistence; the bulk of skilled labor earned less than enough for the average family's comfort; that blacklists are used; that "under cover" men and detectives are employed; that efforts are made to influence the press, pulpit and police authorities.

NEW MEXICO WANTS TO CHANGE ITS NAME

ALBUQUERQUE, N. M., July 29.—(A. P.)—New Mexico residents have started another move to change the name of the state in order, they say, to convince easterners that New Mexico is one of the United States and not a part of the republic south of the line. Urgeonates of the scheme hope

to carry it to the state legislature. Many easterners evidently do not know where New Mexico is on the map. Often, when there is trouble in Mexico, miles below the border, New Mexico residents receive telegrams and letters from eastern relatives and friends asking if there is danger. Post-office officials say letters sometimes arrive from the east bearing foreign stamps and marked "By Way of the Panama Canal."

Native born citizens may oppose the move to change the name as they fear the step would destroy the state's rich history.

STONE POWDER PUFF FOUND IN SOUTHWEST

LOS ANGELES, Cal., July 29.—(A. P.)—Present day girls, with their cosmetics, orange sticks and nail powders, may be chagrined to learn their aboriginal sisters, who deported themselves besides the Pacific generations ago, knew something about personal embellishment.

A stone "powder puff" found on Santa Catalina Island, together with a prehistoric toothbrush, is evidence of the early day activity of the women, according to Ralph Glidden, who made the discovery while searching Indian graves on the island for the Mayo Foundation.

The toothbrush resembled the modern in size, shape and color. The bristles were gill fibres from the jawbone of the stingray. The "puff" probably would seem heavy today, for although it looks like the modern bit of down, it feels like a lump of lead. It was used, it is said, to crush the ochreous in the Spanish-American war.
