LIMERICK IS SCENE OF REIGN OF TERROR

LONDON, July 29.—(U. P.)—A virtual reign of terror exists in Limerick, following attacks on patrols there, and the murder of constable Murray, according to dispatches. The Irish office in London declared extremists in Ireland are attempting to goad soldiers into reprisals, hoping excesses would result which eventually would cause the British public to demand withdrawal of the army. It was announced from Dublin that Sinn Feiners declared a truce in shootings, pending a consideration peace offer from the British government.
