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GOOD AND LOYAL WORK

HUNDREDS of men are participating in the hunt for those who killed Til Taylor and escaped from the county jail Sunday. Many of these men have gone forth time and again to guard specified places in the mountains and to hunt along various streams. They have always been sent to a region where the outlaws were believed to be. They went knowing that in the event of meeting with the escapes there might be a fight and that no man's life would be safe. Yet they went gladly and without flinching.

It is to be hoped the outlaws will be caught and they will be caught sooner or later. But whatever the immediate results may be no one can fail to admire the splendid enthusiasm with which men in all walks of life have responded to the call of public safety. Many have come from outside the county and even outside the state. They have been bent upon a common task of bringing criminals to justice and avenging the death of a beloved sheriff. Their work has been a striking tribute to the popularity of our late sheriff and also proves anew that the virile spirit of the old time west still lives.

THE REAL DRY AND WET FIGHT

THE July 24 number of The American Issue, which is an organ of the anti-saloon and prohibition force, makes it plain that the strengthening or weakening of their cause hinges on the results of the congressional elections instead of the presidential contest. "The fact remains," it says, "that the success of dry law enforcement depends upon whether a wet or dry congress is chosen by the voters in the November elections. The congressional elections, therefore, are of paramount importance."

The announcement is especially significant in view of the attempt of some papers, for partisan reasons, to align the dry forces against Governor Cox upon the representation that if he is elected beer and wine will again be placed upon the public market. "Neither party convention having gone on record in the matter of dry law enforcement," the anti-saloon paper goes on to say, "no candidate for congress will be bound by party utterances on this subject. It will continue to be as it has been in the past a non-partisan issue. The liquor interests recognize this fact and are advising friends in each congressional district to unite on the candidate who is known to be in favor of amending or repealing the Volstead code regardless of party affiliation."

This paper is an authorized spokesman of the prohibition forces. It says very plainly that the two parties stand on the same plane as regards prohibition and that the real danger of a return to the wet regime is through the election of a congress that would repeal or modify the Volstead enforcement law.

On the other hand we have a paper of the stripe of the Oregonian, which admittedly fought the adoption of prohibition in this state, now loudly declaring that Cox must be beaten if prohibition is to be saved for this nation. But listen! What attitude will this self-appointed and self-anointed champion of dry America take on the candidacy of Congressman Pat McArthur who has frankly expressed himself against national prohibition? We pause for an answer.

THE LIGHTED BROOM

THERE are inventions—and inventions. One of the latest is the little electric torch which may be fastened to the broom to light the dark corners. There may still be kitchens in the older parts of the country with corners so dark that they need the lighted broom. But the sooner they give way to kitchens which do not need it, the better.

And the little whimsy is particularly recommended for "long dark hotel corridors whose carpets need daily sweeping, and into which the sun never penetrates."

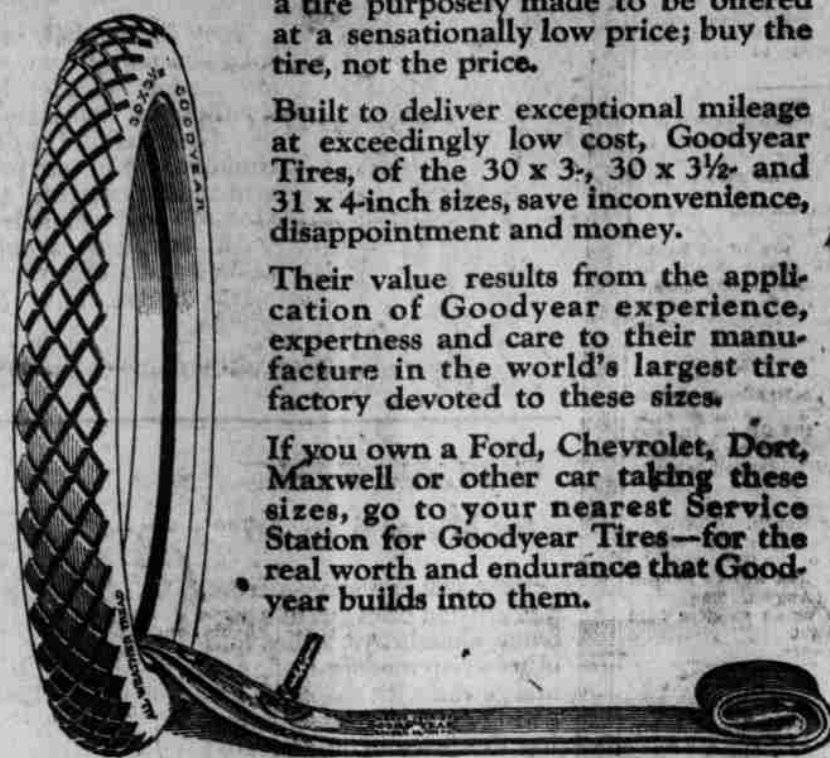

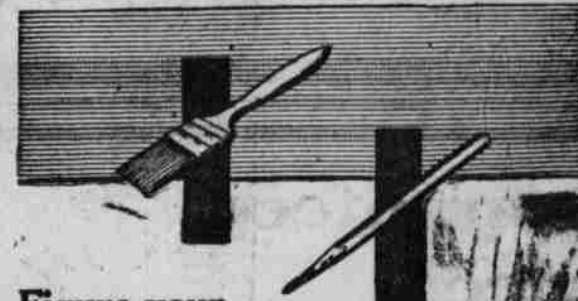
