at that time by the Walla Walla bloodhounds in charge of Earl McInroe and knew that he was near. The brush of the canyon hid them, however.

Separated on Wednesday

"Wednesday morning we separated. I went over to Meacham creek and then down towards Gibbon. The Indians started over the hill towards Meacham creek, too. Dick and Anderson were headed up towards the head of Squaw creek the last I saw them."

Five times since leaving his confederates Rathie says he has eaten. The first showing was Thursday night. It was he who appeared at the Rick's house at Gibbon, the Del Reed place on the Ryan Gulch and at Kidder's this morning. He thinks he was near the Toll Gate yesterday.

Hart Wanted to Kill

"Hart boasted that he would never be taken alive," Rathie said. "When

I asked him if he thought he had killed Sheriff Taylor he said he hoped that he had. He said 'I meant to kill him and I hope I did.'"

Rathie believes that the Indians hit over the hill to Meacham creek near Duncan and went up Cable creek to its head. From there they crossed to the Johnson corral. He did not know that they had been taken and was only able to tell where he surmised they had gone. The Indians, he told, had mentioned various mountains in the territory through which they are known to have passed.

Anderson was slower of foot than the rest of the party and the Indians and Rathie were anxious to separate from him and Patterson. Rathie also told. He has no idea of where they may be. They alone remain at large.

Crowd Assembled.

A large sized crowd assembled at the court house as quickly as word of Rathie's capture spread. Doors to the sheriff's office were locked but no demonstration was made. The crowd dispersed during the lunch hour.

Many who left the court house went to the O. W. R. & N. station, expecting that officers from La Grande might arrive on No. 17 with Hart and Owens. The crowd at the train was yesterday.

larger than that about the court house. They were disappointed when no one arrived with the pair.

Sheriff Lee Noe of Malheur county, who was with the party that took Owens and Hart in the sheep herder's tent last night, arrived at noon and went almost immediately to get some sleep. He had gone without sleep since Tuesday night, he said.

The posse which captured the half-breed Indians was led by Special Deputy Sheriff J. H. McLaughlin. He and four others went to the tent while other members of a posse of 16 assisted.

Report was brought to town by passengers on No. 17 that Anderson and Patterson had been captured on Cabbage Hill but this report was unverified at the sheriff's office. The search for them will be continued unabated, however.
