LLOYD GEORGE SAYS GERMANS NEED HELP

LONDON, Aug. 2.—(A. P.)—The vote for an advance of 5,000,000 pounds to Germany in connection with the Spa coal agreements came up last night in the house of commons. It was agreed to without revision. Labor members welcomed in the proposition what they characterized as a "sensible change in the government policy toward Germany and a practical revision of the unworkable Versailles treaty."

THIRD DEGREE STORY WAS EXAGGERATION

Stories of cruelty bordering on torture, alleged to have been used by officers in getting confessions from Jim Owens and Neil Hart at the county jail Saturday night, are branded as highly exaggerated and unjust by local officials. The story, appearing in a Portland newspaper, was obtained in an interview there with a man who spent several days here last week.

The story brought forth prompt methods of the nature he alleged should not be allowed. When asked concerning the facts, the sheriff's office here gave a different version. Hart was given a blackened eye at the hands of one of the officers who brought him and Owens from La Grange, when in the afternoon he made repeated shouting remarks about the dead sheriff in the presence of his brother, W. H. Taylor. Both he and Owens talked disrespectfully in the jail Saturday night and were fined one dollar each. The sheriff's office said that the officers who were charged with the beating of Hart and Owens were not the officers who were charged with the beating of Hart and Owens. Owens, stubborn at first, was finally taken to the window of the jail and allowed to look at the mob outside. He was told that if he would not tell his story and tell it right, he would be turned over to the mob. Other such acts of intimidation were brought into use to counteract the silliness of the prisoners but no physical punishment was inflicted, officers declared.

FEDERAL EMISSARIES CONFER WITH CANTU

MEXICALI, Aug. 2.—(A. P.)—General Angel Flores and Senior June Huerta, provisional government, early today were enroute to Los Angeles where they, expected to telegraph to Mexico City the result of the conference held here with Governor Cantu, of Lower California. An effort was made at the conference to compose differences which caused Cantu to break off relations with the federal government. The conference was the first step taken which indicated an armed conflict might be avoided and the fact negotiations were actually held caused friends of both parties to hope there may be a peaceful settlement.
