MORE LAURELS COME TO AMERICAN SHOTS IN OLYMPIC EVENTS

Small Bore Rifle and Pistol Matches Indicate Victories; Recheck Gives Tie With South Africa in Team Shoot.

BEVERLOO, Belgium, Aug. 3.—(A. P.)—Incomplete returns of today's pistol and small bore rifle events of the Olympic shooting contests indicate another triumph for the United States, which is believed to have gained first places for individual and teams in both events.

In the pistol match the Brazilians apparently gained second for the team shoot, and Afronia Costa's individual score of 489 is second only to that of K. T. Frederick, an American civilian whose 496 gave him first. Costa borrowed an American pistol and with it beat A. T. Lane, former Olympic pistol champion, who scored 481.

In the small bore rifle match, N. A. Niemein, an American civilian, won 351.

Paul Van Asbroeck, Belgian world's pistol champion, shot badly today.

Official results will not be known until tomorrow, when the meet closes with the army revolver competition.

In addition to the United States there were 19 countries represented today—Sweden, Norway, Denmark, France, Switzerland, Finland, Brazil, Canada, Great Britain and Portugal.

BEVERLOO, Aug. 3.—(A. P.)—A recheck of the targets in yesterday's shootoff of the tie in the 600-meter team event shows that the United States, instead of gaining second place, was again tied with South Africa. The second shootoff was held today, the Americans winning by a score of 284 to 279.

SECOND AIR RACE PLANNED.

NEW YORK, Aug. 3.—(A. P.)—A second transcontinental airplane race over a southern route is planned for the winter by the Aero Club of America, pending sanction of the board of governors, it was announced today. The proposed course is from New York to Los Angeles via the Gulf states and the southwest. The first race is to be held in October from New York to San Francisco.

WATER POLO MATCHES WILL CONCLUDE EACH DAY'S SWIMMING MEET

Program of Events at Olympic Games Includes Races for Women; Many Nations Expected to Send Entries.

ANTWERP, Aug. 3.—(A. P.) The complete program of the swimming events of the Seventh Olympiad to be held here at the big new swimming stadium now under construction here, provides for both day and night events running through eight days. Water polo matches are to conclude each day's program.

So many nations are expected to send teams to compete, that the Olympic committees have arranged that the preliminaries in most of the events shall be conducted in a system of series, perhaps half of the swimmers competing one day and the other half later in the week.

The swimming program, which is one of the few in which women can compete, is expected to draw competitors from most of the famous women swimmers of Sweden, Australia and the United States.

For women there are the 100-meter and 300-meter free swimming races, two classes of diving events and a 400-meter relay.

The various events have been assigned as follows: Sunday, August 22—400-meter free swimming race, preliminaries; Dives, 5 and 10 meters, first and second series; 400-meter side stroke; first round series, one, two, three and four; 100-meter free swimming for women; 100-meter swimming on back, series, one, two, three and four; exhibition of mass swimming; water polo.

Monday, August 23—5 and 10-meter diving, first round, third and fourth series; semi-finals 400-meter free swimming; spring-board diving for women, preliminaries; 400-meter side stroke, first round, series, five, six and seven; semi-finals 100-meter race for women; 100-meter back swimming, first round, series, five, six, seven; water polo.

Tuesday, August 24—Spring-board diving for men, series, one, two and three; final 400-meter free swimming; spring-board diving, men, series, four, five and six; semi-finals, 400-meter side stroke; finals, 100-meter race for women; semi-finals, 100-meter swim-

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ming on back; Pentathlon, 300-meter race; water polo. Wednesday, August 25—Ordinary diving for women, preliminaries; 1-500-meter free swimming, first round, series, one, two and three; finals, men's ordinary diving; finals, 400-meter side and exhibition swimming, women; 100-meter swimming on back, finals; water polo. Thursday, August 26—Fancy diving men, first round, series, one, two and three; 100-meter free swimming; preliminaries; 1,500-meter free swimming preliminaries, series, four, five and six; finals, women's spring-board diving; 200-meter side stroke first round, series, one, two and three; 200-meter free swimming for women, preliminaries; water polo. Friday, August 27—100 meter free swimming, second round, about four series; semi-finals, 1,500 meters race finals men's spring-board diving; 200-meter side stroke, preliminaries for series four, five and six; finals 200-meters women's race; 300-meter relay water polo. Saturday, August 28—Fancy diving for men, preliminaries for series four, five and six; semi-finals, (two series); 100-meter free swimming; finals, 1-500-meter race; finals, women's ordinary diving; semifinals, 200-meter side stroke; water polo. Sunday, August 29—Finals, 100-meter free swimming; finals 400-meter relay, for women; final, fancy diving; finals, 200-meter side stroke; demonstration of water polo by Dutch women; finals, 600-meter relay; water polo.

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CANADA PICKS ENTRY FOR SCULLING RACES. TORONTO, Ont., Aug. 3.—(A. P.)—Robert Dibble of the Don Rowing Club, who was defeated at the Pennsylvania regatta, will represent Canada in the singles of the Olympic sculling events, it was announced today. In the Olympic "tours" the Canadian representative crew will be the Jargonians—R. Ray, H. Parcourt, H. Landrau and S. Hay. A. Everett will be coxswain.

INTERNATIONAL MATCH TO PRECEDE TOURNEY. TOLEDO, O., Aug. 3.—(A. P.)—The international team match as a prelude to the national open golf tournament to be played over the Inverness course next week, will be staged Sunday, it was announced today. The tournament proper is scheduled for August 16-18. In the team match which probably will be a contest of the British experts against the American professionals, Harry Vardon and T. Ray, will make up half the English team. Walter Hagen and James Barnes will head the American contingent.

BIG LEAGUE BASEBALL MEN TO TOUR IN JAPAN. LOS ANGELES, Cal., Aug. 3.—(A. P.)—Japanese baseball men are making elaborate plans for entertaining America and National League players who are scheduled to tour the far east this fall, according to Tom Tompaine, representative here of Yumiko Kusbiki, Japanese baseball promoter. The Americans have games booked at Tokio, Osaka, Kobe, Yokohama, Shanghai and Hongkong. According to present plans they will leave San Francisco in October. Manila and Honolulu will be visited.

INDIANS SOON TO STAGE ANNUAL CROSS COUNTRY. SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 3.—(A. P.)—Dipsea Indians of the San Francisco Olympic Club are preparing to hold their annual seven mile cross country Dipsea Race on September 26. The race will be the sixteenth annual Dipsea run. It will take the usual course over the Lone Tree trail, starting at Mill Valley and finishing at Willow Camp. Mill Valley and Willow Camp are Marin county points across the San Francisco bay from here. Rules of the Pacific Association of the Amateur Athletic Union will govern. No entries will be received from runners under seventeen years of age.
