The new prices are to take effect at once.

City ordinance No. 994, Section 4, covers the point recently raised concerning the movements of so-called "fly-by-night" residents, the Pendleton Commercial Association was informed last night. Deputies are required by this ordinance to report the destination of all persons whose household goods they move, whether within the city or to points without.

Apartments Will Open

There were large numbers of sheriffs, railroad special agents, Portland detectives and citizens from many points in the northwest who assisted and for whose help the association is grateful.

Corps Will Be Organized

Preparations are being made for the formation of life saving corps here August 11 and 12, under the auspices of the Red Cross. Joseph Hedges, swimming expert, will be in the city and the classes are to be held at the Pendleton natatorium. Rex Ellis, of the athletic committee of the Commercial Association, is interesting local swimmers in the formation of the corps. Three corps are to be formed: a senior corps, for men of 18 and over; a women's corps, for women of 18 and over; and a junior corps, for boys from 12 to 15, leaving the boys from 15 to 18 eligible to membership in the auxiliary of the senior corps.

Train and Mail Service Discussed.

Changes in the mail service in and out of Pendleton are causing some dissatisfaction locally, according to discussion which arose at the Commercial Association meeting last night. No eastbound mail is taken on No. 4, leaving here at 12:20 a. m., and complaint is made that mail which is put in the office after 4:30 p. m. must wait until 7:20 next morning to go out on No. 4, on a slow train. Passenger service from Huntington, Baker and La Grande to Pendleton is also declared unsatisfactory since No. 5 ceased to carry a day coach. Under the present arrangement a person can not make a round trip to La Grande in one day and must either return on No. 19, leaving there at 2:15 a. m., or spend the night and return on No. 17, arriving at 11:55 a. m. Both these matters were referred to the committee on transportation.

Preparing for Grain Show

In preparation for the cereal grain show, to be given September 2 and 4 at Sturgis and Storie's under the auspices of the Umatilla County Farm Bureau, Fred Bennion, county agent, will tomorrow plant wheat in boxes to determine effects of seed treatment. The wheat is White Club and is to be planted in boxes nine feet square and in summer fallow from fields in this county. There will be six boxes, and in one box the seed will not be treated, while one of the five boxes will contain wheat treated with bluestone; another treated with bluestone and salt; one with bluestone washed with limestone; one with bluestone and salt and washed with limestone; and another washed with formaldehyde. Mr. Bennion reports that some of the farmers state that seed treatments have resulted in injury to the White Club wheat, which is more susceptible to injury than any other kind.

PARIS FASHIONS STARTLE NATIVES THIS REPORT SAYS

PARIS, Aug. 4.—(U. P.)—This is a great day in Paris. The fall fashion show opened to discover the skirts

rapidly disappearing. Thousands are spending the day with noses flattened against the plate glass shop windows behind which beautiful women displayed forms. Peek-a-boo skirts, and women's wearing apparel, panels overlay and are stitched only part way down, so that the breeze—"censored." The less extreme fall skirts are two inches shorter than last season's and correspondingly tighter. The sleeves are shorter, but the necks are tighter. Some collars are designed to touch the ears.
