Lightning accompanied yesterday's thunderstorm in the Umatilla National Forest, says H. A. Bottcher, deputy supervisor, who received the word today from forest rangers. It is not known whether or not the lightning started forest fire.

Chief Issues Warning.

William Hingold, city fire chief, says that too much care cannot be taken in fire prevention during the dry weather. A small spark, he states, will cause a big grass fire and he urges Pendleton people to be careful in regard to matches, cigarette stumps and bonfires.

Geis, recently ordained to preach for the parishes of Baker.

Grouse Hunters Going Out.

A party of six from Pendleton, Helix and Pilot Rock is leaving this afternoon for the Emulga creek country to hunt grouse. The season in the adjoining county is earlier than in Umatilla. Those who expect to get some of the first grouse of the season are: Dr. F. A. Lueallen, George Done, Fred Mees, C. W. Paulus, L. C. Schardt and Newt Royer.

Tomatoes Are Picked.

The tomato crop in the Milton-Freewater region is being harvested and shipped, says Fred Bennion, county agent, who recently visited the east end of the county. Mr. Bennion says that the apple yield will be good this year, the crop averaging 60 to 70 per cent. Some apple, prune and cherry trees show damage after last winter's severe weather, he states.

Special Fruit Train Running.

The O. W. R. & N. is running a special fruit train nightly between Walla Walla and Pendleton to handle express fruit shipments that formerly came here on No. 1. The train arrives here from the east end of the county around 9 o'clock at night and makes the trip back during the night. This service is in addition to the day freight runs and regular passenger service.

Engineer to Take Vacation.

City Engineer Frank B. Hayes and Mrs. Hayes and their son will leave by auto either Sunday or Monday morning on a vacation trip of two weeks, which will include a visit to Portland and the Puget Sound territory. Mr. Hayes plans to attend the national convention of the American Society of Civil Engineers at Portland next week and to inspect concrete paving in some of the cities of Washington cities.

Fugitives' Trail Still Plain.

The trail followed by Hart and Owens over the mountains last week is still plain this week, according to W. D. Humphrey, who has recently been out for huckleberries near the summit. The pair followed the main divide trail for eight miles in broad daylight, Mr. Humphrey says, and passed numerous parties who were at that time out huckleberrying. Plenty of tracks are still visible showing the route taken by the bad men. The berries, incidentally, are ripening rapidly now and are quite plentiful in the mountains, Mr. Humphrey reports.

Weston Wheat Good.

The quality of Weston wheat is excellent and is much better than last year's crop, says Fred Bennion, county agent, who visited Weston yesterday. Mr. Bennion says that the grain is free from smut and that the yield is as large as it was in 1919. Harvest is on in full swing and the wheat is being shipped out as fast as possible. Mr. Bennion brought home nine sacks of heads of Red Chaff wheat, which will be threshed separately and planted this fall. Heads true to type were chosen, and show the flaring top while his characteristic of Red Chaff. Mr. Bennion states that no Red Chaff grown in the county contains less than 10 per cent of other wheats and he is very desirous of getting pure seed in this variety.
