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NATIONAL GUARD RIFE TEAMS IN COMPETITION

CAMP PERRY, O., Aug. 7.—(A. P.)—Colorado and Ohio rifle teams held top places among the national guard teams in today's events of the small arms firing school. In the civilian rifle contests teams from Michigan, Arizona, Iowa, Massachusetts, Indiana, Minnesota, Montana and Florida were in the lead. The scores show that the civilian teams are leading the guardsmen on the pistol firing, with New Mexico, Minnesota and Rhode Island holding first places, with Oregon, Minnesota and Texas ranking high on the soldiers' list.

TOLEDO, O., Aug. 7.—(A. P.)—Len McDonald, the Indianapolis driver, enjoyed a field day at the Port Miami track on get-away day Friday, winning two out of three events. McDonald headed the list in 2:08 time with Baron Cegantle and the 2:16 trot with Dottie Day.

Baron Cegantle captured the lead-

man sweepstakes from the favorite, Peter Coley who made bad breaks in the first two heats, and then was outtrotted in the final mile while Dan de Lopez was piloted out in front by Pop Geers. The finishes were close, while the time was the three fastest heats trotted this season. Best time 2:04 1-4.

Dottie Day won the 2:20 trot. Best time 2:05 1-4.

The Boston man won his first race of the year when W. Fleming came through with him in the 2:15 pace. Bonique came through at the wire in the third heat and won. Best time 2:05 1-4.

LEAGUE ADVOCATE IS VICTOR IN MISSOURI

ST. LOUIS, Aug. 7.—(A. P.)—With the gubernatorial nominations virtually decided on both republican and democratic tickets, according to incomplete, unofficial returns from Tuesday's primary, political interest tonight is centering on the race between senatorial candidates.

Returns are coming in slowly but a tabulation by the Globe Democrat from approximately 2000 precincts, including St. Louis, shows Breckinridge Long former third assistant secretary of state and advocate of the league of nations, leading for the democratic nomination with 29,839, former federal Judge Henry S. Priest, who made the race on an anti-league and war platform, second with 22,109, and Charles M. Hay, pro-league and dry, 25,993.

LEWIS IS THANKED FOR STRIKE EFFORTS

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., Aug. 7.—(A. P.)—President Wilson has expressed to John L. Lewis, president of the United Mine Workers of America, his gratification over the prompt action taken by Mr. Lewis in directing the striking coal miners of Illinois and Indiana to return to work. Lewis received the letter from President Wilson today saying:

"Your action has gratified me very deeply indeed. It is the action of a patriotic citizen and a man of vision. I am glad that you feel as I do that it is urging the men to return to work. I was speaking in their interest as much as in the interest of the general public and of the industrial energy of the country."

Today President Lewis sent telegrams to 30 local unions in Kansas, ordering the striking miners there to return. According to Mr. Lewis 3488 miners are on strike in the Kansas field.

In his telegrams, President Lewis declared the strikers are in violation of a contract between the miners and the Southern Coal Operators.

LEAGUE PRESIDENT TO THRESH OUT SCANDAL

LOS ANGELES, Cal., Aug. 7.—(A. P.)—H. McCarthy of San Francisco, president of the Pacific Coast Baseball League will arrive here Sunday to complete his investigation of the case of "Babe" Borton, Vernon first baseman, according to telegram received from him today by Ed. R. Mator, Vernon owner.

Gambling on ball games and other charges have been made against Borton by McCarthy, who has said the Tiger player must name persons involved in an alleged "crap" game before he can receive a trial by league directors.

Borton has declined to give names or to say anything except that "it is his own business" and that he is confident of vindication.

LADRONES SEE THIRD CHANGE IN LANGUAGE

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., Aug. 7.—(A. P.)—The passing of Magellan's "Isle of the thieves," the Ladrones, from German to Japanese control, marks the third time within a generation that the inhabitants have been subjected to a change in official language.

"I'm going home to move my family a few miles south of Guam, under the Stars and Stripes, where they can talk any language they please," declared Juan Flores, discharged soldier, at the Marine Corps recruiting station here before departing to the Pacific isle.

He told how his parents were content under the Spanish rule, when in 1899, the Ladrones, known also as the Mariana Islands, were disposed of, the southern island of Guam going to the United States and the northern islands, including Saipan where his family lived, being sold to Germany. The Spanish, in the days when they had taken the island from the Portuguese, decreed Spanish as the official language.

The Germans in 1920 made German

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the official language.
Now, as a result of the war, German control of the Mariana Islands, with the Marshall and Caroline groups

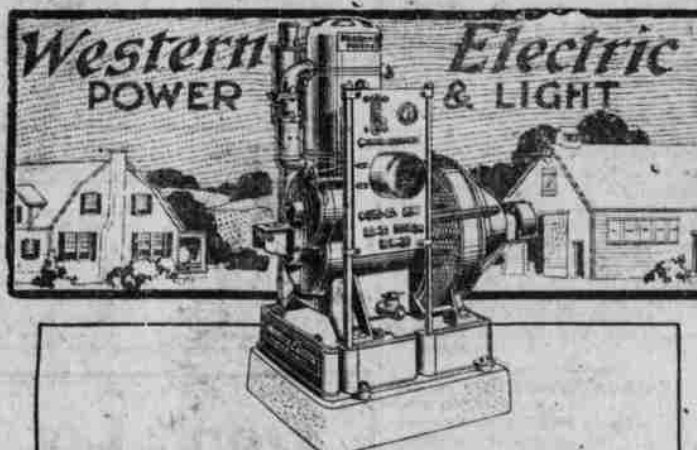
went to Japan and Japanese is the official language.
The population of the Marianas under Japanese control is 10,000 of whom about 3,000 are Japanese.

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
