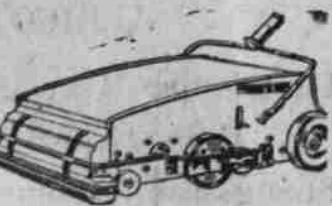

Stock Market Upward

NEW YORK, Aug. 13.—Prices of stocks advanced again today. Apart from an interval of heaviness at the start and some yielding at the close when traders took profits, the trend was upward. Prominence given developments in the Russian-Polish situation produced early selling which carried down the list 4 to 5 points. Pressure soon eased and the market gradually crept upward on diminished dealings.

By early afternoon all losses had been recovered and many stocks ruled 1 to 2 points above yesterday's close. Low priced oils, sugars, motors rubbers, shippings, tobacco, steel, International Nickel, United States Alcohols and American Woolen were carried up smartly.

Total sales approximated 450,000 shares.

The money market gave early indications of easing, the call rate falling to 6 per cent before mid-day after renewals had been established at 7 per cent. Stringent conditions continued to prevail as to time money.

owed by movements during the past few days, took place today. One large dealer reduced his list price on the fine granulated from 21 cents to a fraction over 17 cents a pound, and raw sugar sold on a basis of 12.04 cents, 10 cents less than the high level of three months ago.

Holders of large stocks of sugar expressed the fear that they had over-stayed the market. Dealers declared the weakness is due to lack of demand for refined sugar, free offering and a feeling of unrest.

Export Rumors Cause

Wheat Price to Rise.

CHICAGO, Aug. 13.—Wheat made a lively advance in price today, stirred on by general belief that a big export business was being done. The market closed strong 5 1/8 to 5 1/2 net higher with December 2.44 1/2 to 2.45 and March 2.47 7/8. Corn finished 2 1/8 to 4 1/2 up, oats unchanged to 7/8 higher and provisions varying from 10c decline to a like advance.

Opinion was widespread that foreigners were buying under cover in the wheat trade, and the fact later developed that the British royal commission had purchased some wheat and was bidding for more. Knowledge that Great Britain had re-entered the market had a decided bullish influence, and so too did a noticeable scarcity of offerings. Besides, unconfirmed gossip was current that South America as well as Europe was buying wheat in the United States. In this connection, it was said, shipments out of Argentina this week expected to be only about 500,000 bushels as against 4,442,000 bushels last week.

Corn rose with wheat.

Oats were firm.

Dealings in provisions appeared to be virtually confined to packers and carriers changing trades from September to October.

SAYS LEAGUE WOULD HAVE SAVED POLAND

MILWAUKEE, Wis., Aug. 13.—(A. P.)—Endorsement of the league of nations by the United States would have saved Poland, Franklin D. Roosevelt declared here last night. The moral effect of American membership in the league would have halted the Russian armies without a single American soldier crossing the seas, he said. "History will lay a great share of the responsibility for the plight of Poland upon those little, narrow men in the United States senate, those little narrow men who today control the machinery of the republican party," he declared. "But

for their desire to satisfy personal spirit, the bolshevists would not be knocking at the gates of Warsaw."

"The heart of America goes out to the Polish nation. Our hands are tied, because of the obstructionists methods of Senator Harding's group of senators, the United States is still technically at war. It is not a member of the league of nations. All it can do is offer advice and sympathy."

Mr. Roosevelt's speech came as an answer to criticism that he avoided the issue in his Chicago speech last night. "I am not afraid of the league of nations," he declared, and described the covenant as an application of more law to international relations."

IDAHO MINER WANTED; HERO'S MEDAL AWAITS

MILLAN, Idaho, Aug. 13.—Jacob Delmarek, miner, is wanted here by C. L. Herrick, manager of the Gold Hunter Mining company of this place, who wishes to pin a medal on him. When two men were entombed last year in the Gold Hunter mine, Delmarek and other miners worked day and night, regardless of their own danger, to rescue the imprisoned men. Then another cave-in occurred

and Delmarek and another miner, James Collins, were caught. It was nearly 24 hours before they were rescued, and during most of that time they were buried to their waists in muck. The two men have been awarded medals by the United States bureau of mines, but long ago Delmarek shouldered his blankets and went off to some other camp, as miners do.

WAR TRUCKS ALLOTTED FOR ROAD BUILDING

HELENA, Mont., Aug. 13.—A Washington, D. C. dispatch says Montana has received from the war department through the bureau of public roads of the department of agriculture, 114 trucks of various kinds and a vast quantity of other valuable material for use in state road work.

This statement is outlined in a letter from John N. Eddy of Helena, chief engineer of the Montana highway commission, to Dr. C. J. Owens of the Southern Commercial Congress. It is under a provision framed by Dr. Owens and introduced into the senate by Senator Bankhead that war trucks and material are being allotted the states for highway building.
