### LONG TRIP, HOT DAYS HANDICAPPED ATHLETES

MOSCOW, Idaho, Aug. 12.—The six-day trans-continental trip and the unrelenting eastern weather proved a serious blow to Pacific coast athletes who were entered in the Olympic try-outs, said Tom Matthews, Idaho track coach, who has returned to Moscow from his trip to New York

City with Leon Perrin and R. Nell Irving, the two University of Idaho men who won places in the Olympic pentathlon tryouts. "Irving suffered a loss of 15 pounds in weight, and in spite of everything that we did, was so far off form that he was able to pull the shot only 23 feet, and the javelin only 185 feet," said Matthews. Irving's poorest performances in these events in collegiate competition this year were 47 feet and 170 feet, respectively. "After Irving tied for fifth place in the pentathlon tryouts, he continued to lose weight, and it is doubtful if he could have recovered in time for

The games in Antwerp, had he been taken across," continued the coach. "Perrine's marks in the Olympic tryouts were far below his usual standard. He was handicapped not only by the heat, but by a sore right foot which compelled him to do all his jumping with his left foot." MEMBERSHIP FIGHT IS PROMISED WHEN ARMY AND NAVY MEN MEET VANCOUVER, B. C., Aug. 12.—(By Canadian Press)—There are indica-

tions that there will be at least one strenuous struggle when, on October 11, the annual convention of the Army and Navy Veterans' association of Canada opens here. Western commands are determinedly preparing to wage a big fight to bring about a change in the qualifications which entitle a man to membership in the association. At present to be entitled to membership, a man must have served six years with the imperial forces or have had nine years with the active militia, or must have won a war decoration. The proposed change calls for only

three years' service with the active militia or in the regular army, or six months with the Canadian expeditionary force. WASHINGTON HOPEFULS LOSE OUT IN TENNIS SEATTLE, Aug. 12.—(A. P.)—Oregon and California players won most of their matches against Wash-

ington opponents in yesterday's elimination rounds of the Washington state tennis championship tournament being held here. Howard Kinsey of California, defeated Wallace Scott, Tacoma, 4-1, 4-4, in one of the feature matches, and Irving Weinstein, San Francisco, defeated Bob Heaketh, Seattle, in three sets, 6-0, 5-7, 6-0. Phil Neer, Portland, Oregon state champion won from Sam Russell, Seattle, in straight sets, 7-5, 6-1. The first morning play of the series will begin with the semi-finals tomorrow.

—Two out of the three events in today's Great Western card went to winners in straight heats, Action, driven by Harris winning the 2:13 trot, and Chimes Wood, the 2:24 trot.
