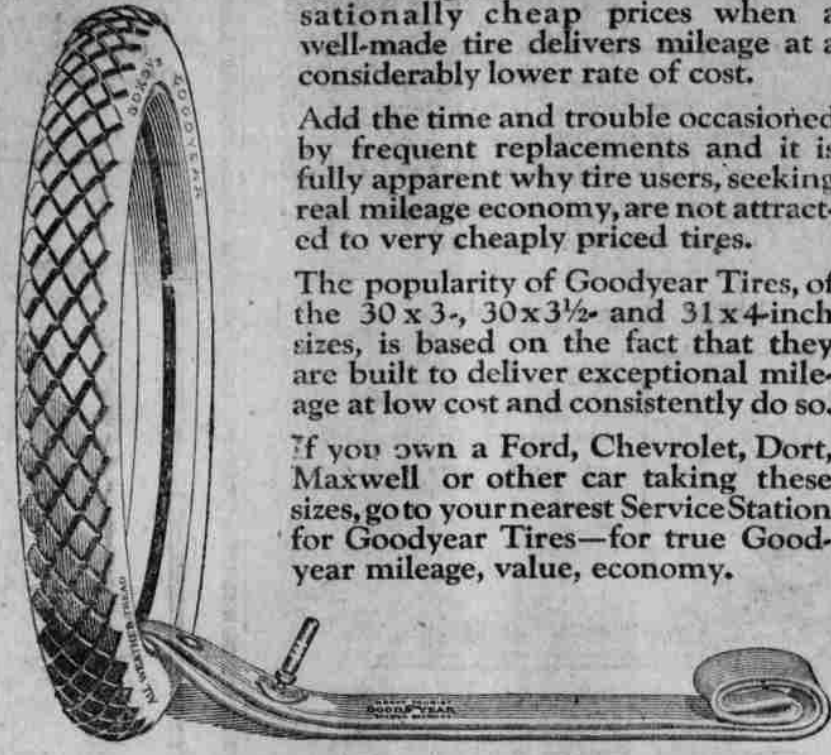
## BEND FOLK END VISIT WITH ECHO RELATIVES
