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NINTH INNING REVIVAL GIVES RAINIERS CONTEST

SEATTLE, Aug. 14.—(A. P.)—Three hits and a walk in the ninth inning, scored two runs, enabled Seattle to win a loosely played game from Portland 10 to 9. Portland overcame a 6-run lead, only to lose out in the last inning. Both teams used three pitchers. Wistral, Portland third baseman, hit three doubles and a single in five times up.

MAILS TRIMS SALT LAKE.
SALT LAKE CITY, Utah, Aug. 14.—With Southpaw Walter Mails in the box Sacramento came from behind in the seventh inning and won from Salt Lake, 7 to 2. Four hits netted the Senators as many runs in the seventh inning off Ralph Stroud and in the ninth inning with Gould pitching two more tallies were scored. Another tally was scored in the fifth.

SEALS WIN OUT, 3-2.
SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 14.—San Francisco came from behind, overcame a two-run lead and defeated Los Angeles, 3 to 2, the third straight victory for the Seals. The locals drove Crandall to the showers in the sixth inning and scored the winning run in the eighth after two men were out. Agney walked, reached third on

TIGERS LOSE THIRD STRAIGHT.
LOS ANGELES, Aug. 14.—Fans saw Oakland take its third straight game from Vernon, 5 to 2. The Tigers struggled against superior team work by the Oaks and against such morale-destroying cries from the grandstand and bleachers as "where's all your money gone?" and "a little more change." They even changed their lineup in an effort to stop the Oaks, every one of whom made a hit, while five reached home.

RAY WINS CHAMPIONSHIP FROM YANKEE GOLFERS

TOLEDO, O., Aug. 14.—Edward Ray of England, Friday won the national golf championship of America at Inverness, with a score of 295 for 72 holes, carrying the cup to England for the second time, Harry Vardon having won the title 20 years ago and lacking only two strokes of capturing it again today.
It was only by a stroke that the long driving Briton snatched the honor, three young Americans, Leo Diegel and Jack Hutchinson of Chicago, run in the eighth after two men were out. Agney walked, reached third on

the winner, who also outstripped his countryman, Vardon, by a single stroke.
Vardon seemed to have the title clinched nearly all day, starting slightly behind this morning and leading by a stroke at the end of the first 18 holes with 218, while Diegel and Hutchinson had 219 and Ray 220. Vardon increased his chances by scoring 35, one over par, on the first nine of the last round, but he began to miss his shots both from the tee and on the green, taking six on the 522 yard 12th and a 430-yard 17th and three fives for a 42 on the final lap.
Ray said he had expected to win from the Americans, but had not felt he would outplay Vardon. He expected the cup, emblematic of the title, with brief words of thanks and the trophy will repose at Oxy club, England, until some one else wins it.

NEER AND TYLER ARE LOSERS TO CALIFORNIANS

SEATTLE, Aug. 14.—(A. P.)—The men's singles title of the Washington state tennis championship tourney will be carried to California this year as the result of the elimination of Phil Neer, Oregon state champion, and Joe Tyler, Seattle, in singles matches, by Howard Kinsey and Irving Weinstein, Californians, in Friday's semi-final events.
Kinsey defeated Neer in three straight sets, 6-2, 6-1, 6-2, while Weinstein outlasted Tyler in a long four set struggle winning 6-1, 6-8, 6-3, 6-1. The Californians will meet in the finals today.

GRIFFIN AND JOHNSTON LOSERS IN DOUBLES

NEWPORT, R. I., Aug. 14.—(A. P.)—Norris Williams, H. and Richard Harte furnished the big surprise of the Casino lawn tennis tournament Friday by defeating W. M. Johnston, national champion, and C. J. Griffin in the final of the doubles. The match went five sets, the score being 6-2, 3-6, 7-5, 2-6, 6-3.
Johnston will meet Griffin in the final of the singles tomorrow as a result of their victories over Willis Davis and Roland Roberts, respectively.

CONFESSED LEADER OF RADICALS IS TRAPPED

CHICAGO, Aug. 14.—(A. P.)—Herbert G. Hoffman, confessed radical and member of a gang headed by John Alexander, police said, was arrested yesterday. With his arrest, detectives said they gained considerable information regarding the activities of the band, three alleged members of which were seized several days ago.
Hoffman, who returned from Germany two months ago, admitted, detectives said, he had been there spreading bolshevik literature and conferring with members of the alleged international radical organization. "I'm through with all this red stuff," Hoffman said. "When a man has looked over the conditions in Ger-

many and these foreign countries and compared them with the good old United States he is certainly a fool to claim any other creed than "American first, last and all the time."
While in Germany, Hoffman said he held conferences with John Burton, indicted with William Bros Lloyd and others recently sentenced on charges of seditious acts.

FUNERAL HALTED AND FIFTH DEATH FROM PLAQUE IS FOUND

BEAUMONT, Texas, Aug. 14.—City health authorities stopped a negro funeral yesterday, turned the hearse back to the undertaking parlor and, after an examination of the corpse of a 7-year-old negro boy, announced that the child had died of bubonic plague.
This is the fifth death from plague here, out of 12 cases reported.
