PENDLETON INVITED TO RECLAMATION CONGRESS

Pendleton today was invited to send representatives to the Northwest Reclamation and Development Congress which will meet in Seattle September 16 and 17. Delegates interested in irrigation from Montana, Idaho, Wyoming, Oregon and Washington have been invited by the executive committee of the congress to attend. The matter has been referred to President J. H. Kiley of the Pendleton Commercial Association.

In the belief that if the states of Montana, Idaho, Wyoming, Oregon and Washington get together on a sound, aggressive program for the development of arid lands of the northwest, that national attention will be attracted to this great section and advance the time when the development will proceed rapidly, the congress has been called to assemble at Seattle September 16 and 17.

There are ten million acres of arid lands in the northwest which should be irrigated at once, states the executive committee which was composed at first of representatives of the Chamber of Commerce of Portland, Tacoma, Seattle and Spokane, and which now includes representatives from the five states. The final details for the congress will be arranged at the conference to be held at Boise, Aug. 29, to be attended by representatives from the cities of the five states. A general invitation to attend has been extended to 5000 men from the five states who are known to be interested in a straight-forward irrigation program. The republican and democratic parties have been asked to have their presidential candidates or men high in the party speak at the conference.

Secretary of the Interior John Barton Payne is expected to attend if official business does not prevent. Herbert Hoover has been asked to express his opinion of what the government should do towards increasing the future production by reclaiming arid lands in the northwest, and Arthur P. Davis, chief of the United States Reclamation Service of the government was in Seattle last week to further the congress.

JOURNAL MAN SAYS CARAVAN IS POSSIBLE

A caravan of 100 automobiles to bring spectators from Portland and vicinity to the Round-Up is possible, Frank Clavon, of the automotive department of the Oregon Journal, said Saturday night after making a survey of conditions here and of the road from Portland to Pendleton. The Journal is considering sponsoring a tour of this kind to the Round-Up for the first time in history.

After looking over the camp ground facilities here and meeting with officials of the Round-Up, Mr. Clavon expressed himself as well pleased with the outlook. He said he would take up with Chairman S. Benson, of the State Highway Commission, the possibility of hastening improvement of the bridges across the Deschutes and John Day rivers. He was assured by County Judge Marsh that the road between Echo and Pendleton would be in good shape for Round-Up tourists. Mr. Clavon drove here by auto from Portland on Friday, accompanying Mr. and Mrs. Albee, of Portland. They left early Sunday morning on the return trip.

DEMOCRATS PUT TAYLOR ON BALLOT FOR SHERIFF

William R. "Jinks" Taylor was chosen Saturday afternoon to fill the place as nominee for Sheriff on the democratic county ticket, made vacant by the death of his brother, Sheriff T. D. Taylor. The nominee is now serving out his brother's unexpired term as sheriff under appointment by the county commissioners. Sheriff Taylor has had a number of years' experience as a deputy sheriff in the Athens precinct. His business interests there kept him from taking an active part in the work of the office. The nominee is widely acquainted throughout the county, having spent most of his life here. He will be opposed for the office in the general election by Zoeth Houser, of Echo, republican nominee.

DOMINION AIR FORCE HAS BEGUN TRAINING

Ottawa, Ont., Aug. 15.—(U. P.)—The initial period of training of the Canadian Air Force begins at Camp Borden, north of Toronto, August 15. Over one hundred aeroplanes, a number of flying boats and a complete outfit for instruction in aerial photography, wireless and gunnery are being employed.

Machines valued at between five and six million dollars have been presented to the Canadian Air Force by the British government. There is a fine airfield at Camp Borden and it is in all respects well equipped for one period of training which will occupy 25 days.
