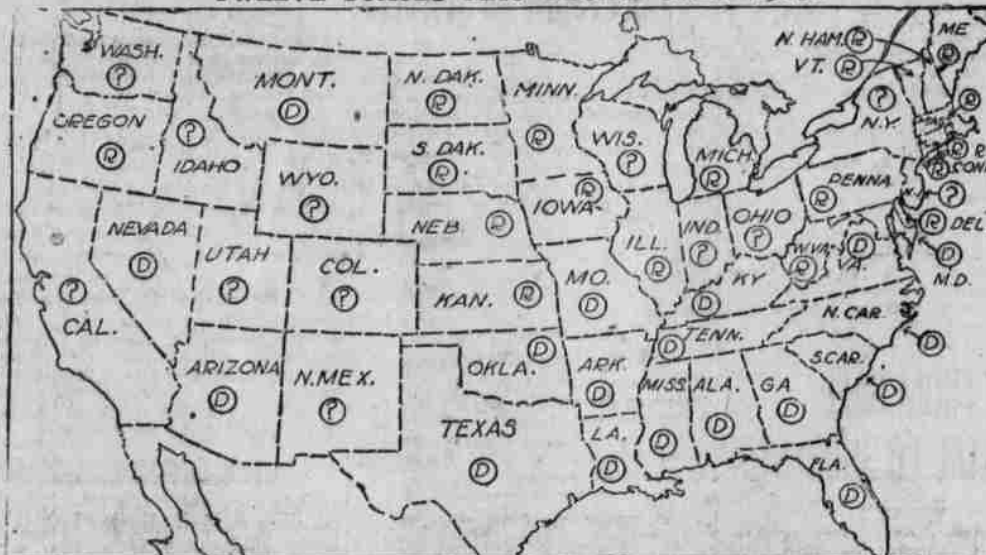

TWELVE STATES MAY DECIDE PRESIDENCY



Twelve states may decide who'll be the next president. Each party is reasonably certain to carry 12 states, those marked "D" on the map being Democratic, and those marked "R," Republican. The rest, marked "I," are: California, Colorado, Idaho, Indiana, New Jersey, New Mexico, New York, Ohio, Utah, Washington, Wisconsin, Wyoming. They have 151 electoral votes, or one-third of the total, 531. The party that can carry the three doubtful states of New York, Ohio and Indiana, it is said, can win.

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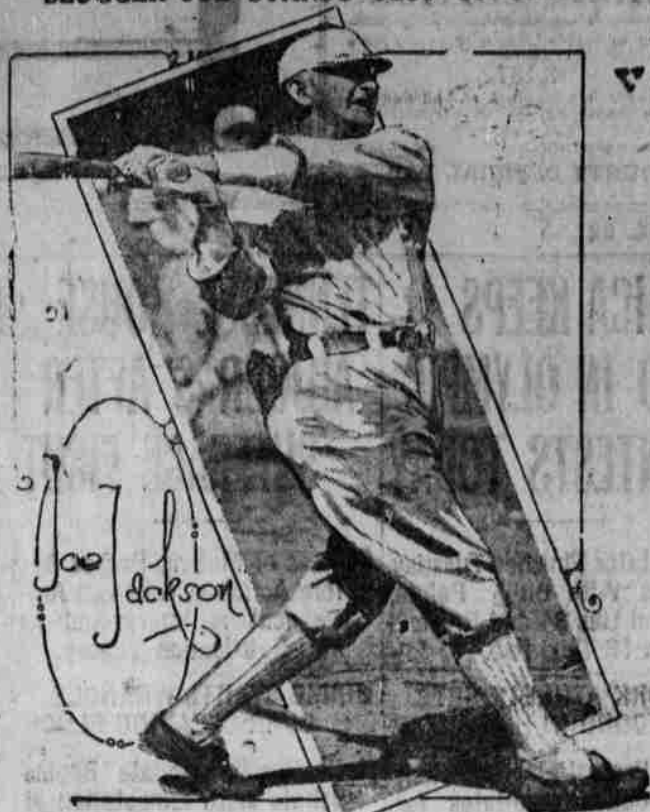
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SLUGGER JOE STANDS TEST OF TIME

LIMERICK IS SCENE OF WILD OUTBREAK

LIMERICK, Aug. 17.—(U. P.)—Wild scenes occurred here during the night, following the shooting of a policeman. The shooting was attributed to an accident, but the military police ran amuck, firing fusillades into the crowds which were waiting at the railway station. Many houses were burned. Patrick Lynch was taken from his home and executed in front of it, allegedly by the military.

WOOLEN FIRM FILES ANSWER TO APPEAL

WASHINGTON, Aug. 17.—(U. P.)—The American Woollen company today filed in the United States supreme court an answer to the government appeal from a decision of the lower courts in a quashing indictment against the company under the Lever act. The company, in answer, contends that wool is not necessary under a tested act, until it had been made into cloth, cut up and manufactured into clothing. For that reason the answer contends, the government cannot prosecute under the Lever act's "price provision."

CANTU REBELLION IS DECLARED SETTLED

MEXICO CITY, Aug. 17.—(A. P.)—That rebellion of Governor Estelban Cantu of Lower California, against the provisional government has been settled, was officially confirmed here today, according to local newspapers.

Agreement Denied

CALEXICO, Aug. 17.—(U. P.)—While denying Mexico City reports that an agreement was reached between Governor Cantu of Lower California and General Salazar for the resignation of Cantu, at Cantu's headquarters at Mexicali today admitted that negotiations were continuing with the federal authorities. Cantu conferred yesterday with American army officers at the customs house here regarding means for protecting American interests and property.

CRUISER WILL PROTECT AMERICANS IN BALTIC

WASHINGTON, Aug. 17.—(U. P.)—Admiral Halse, commanding the United States cruiser Pittsburgh, has been ordered to the Baltic sea to protect Americans in that district. A destroyer will accompany the Pittsburgh. The navy department took this step in belief that American refugees may be fleeing to Baltic ports as result of the bolshevik offensive against Poland. American naval forces in the Black sea, Mediterranean and Adriatic waters, where conditions are also unsettled, will soon be reinforced by a battleship the St. Louis and six destroyers for that district, to protect American relief workers scattered throughout that area.

BOXING BAN REMOVED; MANILA LIKES SPORT

MANILA, P. I., Aug. 17.—(A. P.)—Prize fighting at private clubs, which has been under a ban in Manila for more than six months again is flourishing, the ban having been removed by Mayor Ramon Fernandez.

The mayor has issued temporary license to a club which conducts the matches and he said as soon as the management changes the by-laws as suggested by the city attorney he will grant a permanent license.

SPOKANE, Aug. 17.—(A. P.)—United States Senator Miles PoinDEXTER, chairman of the Republican Senatorial campaign committee, will go to Seattle in a few days to look after campaign affairs on the coast. It was announced at his headquarters here yesterday.
