Telephone Office Expands.

The new room for the Pacific Telephone & Telegraph office having been virtually completed, the offices of Manager J. A. Murray and the business office will be moved either today or Saturday. No front has yet been put in the building and the interior finishing is yet to be done.

Car Is Expected.

Another car of distillate, ordered through the Umatilla county Farm Bureau, is expected here soon. There will be 7000 gallons in the shipment and it is for Pendleton farmers. A car of 10,000 gallons was distributed yesterday to 11 farmers of the Blakely district. The price is 21½ cents a gallon.

Academy Will Open.

St. Joseph's Academy will open September 8, according to announcements made today. The new building which adjoins the old structure will be occupied. The addition is of reinforced concrete and is a modern building which will be used for class rooms and for other purposes. Another addition to the academy will be the new \$9,000 boys' dormitory, now under process of construction.

Pictures of 25 Riverside school children being served with lunch at the school house were taken today under the direction of Miss Ella May Harmon, home demonstration agent. The pictures will be sent to the Salem State Fair to show the work carried on by rural schools. Pictures of hats and dress forms made under the supervision of the agents, office, were taken also, and this afternoon pictures of sewing work will be taken.

that they have dozens of inquiries daily for homes to rent. There is not only a lack of homes but of apartments as well.

While the new Security apartments are shortly to be opened, there is no relief expressed that few houses will be vacated as these are filled. Many who will occupy these apartments are now living in hotels or other apartments which are spoken for.

Rescued in Tent Houses.

A resume of building permits for this year and the corresponding time of 1919 will show little new home building has been done here. High cost of labor and materials, coupled with a tight money market, have been factors holding down the building of houses. Many in the city are residing in tent houses or small dwellings made over from barns and chicken houses. Desirable homes are next to impossible to obtain, and while many are on the market for sale, would-be buyers say they cannot obtain sufficient money to swing the deal.
