Rain Causes Delay

A heavy shower yesterday afternoon caused a second costly delay in harvest to Umatilla county farmers and also caused damage to wheat. The rainfall was general throughout the county and totaled .26 of an inch. Today the maximum is 70 with a minimum of 47. The barometer registers 29.63, and while it is rising a little. Major Lee Moorhouse official weather observer, says that the weather is still unsettled.

Plan Pruning School.

Plans for a pruning school, to be held sometime in December, were made tentatively yesterday when C. L. Long, new extension specialist in horticulture at O. A. C., and Fred Bennett, county agriculture agent, visited orchards in the east end of the county. In company with J. E. Slover and M. M. Mumford, representing the Umatilla county Farm Bureau. It is probable that the school would be held in Mr. Slover's orchard at Frenwater. Mr. Long, after an inspection of the trees yesterday, advised farmers to cut out the dead wood before the leaves fall, as it is possible at this time to determine by the leaves which are alive and which are dead. It was noted yesterday that sodium nitrate, used as a fertilizer, greatly benefited trees. Thirty-six trees owned by Mr. Slover showed great improvement because of the use of nitrate. Mr. Long advises the use of the sodium nitrate, but no general application as it is likely to make some trees too woody.

Plan Luncheon for Murphy

A luncheon will be given on Thursday, Sept. 9, for Paul D. Murphy, who is to speak here under the auspices of the State Bankers Association against the proposed amendment to limit the legal rate of interest in Oregon to 4 and 5 per cent. Robert E. Smith, of Portland, an officer of the organization, was notified by wire today that such a meeting would be held. Mr. Murphy will arrive from La Grande at noon on that day and leave here for within a mile of the heart of Weston at midnight. The place of the luncheon has not yet been decided upon.

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Drive New Car Here

Jack Dolph and Lyman Rice arrived last evening by motor from Portland, having driven yesterday from Hood River. Mr. Dolph brought up a new enclosed car belonging to Mrs. G. E. Peringer and Mr. Rice accompanied him. They found roads much improved as the result of the recent rains.

May Start Street Work Monday

Laying of the curbs on Garfield street, between Jackson and Martin, probably will be started by the Warren Construction Co. Monday morning. Manager Pat Longman said today. Grading and the laying of pipes in the street will follow. There is a shortage of cement for construction purposes in this region, Mr. Longman said, but he believes enough will be available for the curb work. The paving plant at Milton is still busy furnishing materials for a few blocks that are being paved there. By the time Garfield street is ready to receive the hot stuff the plant will have been moved here.

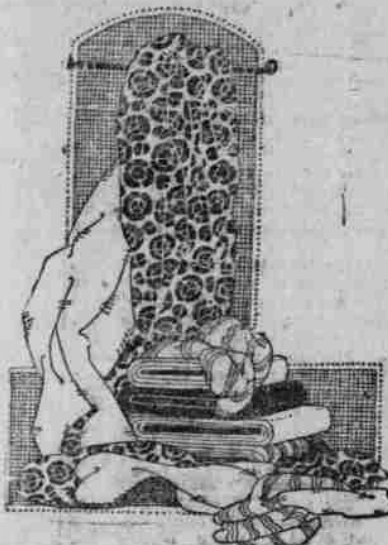
