THE Cox charges about a mammoth fund to buy the presidency for Harding are absurd, say the old guard managers. They always deny such charges. The Newberry managers said the same thing but the evidence in the Newberry case, before a republican judge in a republican district, convinced the jury that Newberry was guilty and he is under a penal sentence.

The Wood and Lowden managers scoffed at charges they were using big campaign funds. But the investigation by the senate committee proved the charges were true and the Chicago convention did not dare nominate either man for the presidency.

In his Pittsburg speech Governor Cox presented unquestionable evidence in support of his accusations. He proved his case by documents from the republican national committee itself. The facts presented leave no room for doubt. The governor's sole mistake was that he placed his figures too low. He should have said 25 millions instead of 15 million.

The question now is whether the people want a campaign wherein a side may win that can buy up the most votes in doubtful states, that can place clever political workers in the field, influence newspaper support and otherwise use the campaign chest to carry the day. Do they want the election won on the merits of the issues involved or would they have the presidency auctioned off to the highest bidder?

The routine partisan voter may excuse the Harding campaign fund but the voter of independent mind will not shut his eyes to such facts and the fate of the election rests with the independent voter.

THE WAY TO CURE CALIFORNIA

PORTLAND newspapers are indignant that California literature lists the Pendleton Round-Up as one of the attractions of the California territory. But Oregon has the same opportunity to annex California so why complain?

Meanwhile let us study our neighbor and see what we can learn. Does California come to Oregon to acquire school teachers? They do not. California has five state normal schools, located respectively at Chico, Los Angeles, San Diego and San Jose. Contrasted with those well located institutions Oregon has one school, located at Monmouth. We need a school in Eastern Oregon and one in Southern Oregon. We cannot have good schools without training teachers for them.

Now the problem in Oregon can be solved any time the Portland newspapers listen to the bells of progress and take off their coats for a little campaigning. A meritorious measure on the ballot two years ago failed because it could not get journalistic support in Portland. The people would gladly vote for proper normal schools in Oregon if they knew the facts. Thus far our metropolitan press has left them in blissful ignorance of the situation and its dangers. The condition is injurious to the whole state, Portland included, but the Portland papers are so busy being jealous of California that they lack time to develop Oregon.

Wake up, gentlemen, and let us hasten the time when San Francisco will boast that it is located just south of Oregon—the wonder spot of the west.
