AMERICAN OARSMEN QUALIFY IN TRIALS AT OLYMPIC GAMES

Singles, Doubles and Eights All Win Preliminaries and Wrestlers Annex Title; Swedes Win Pentathlon Event.

BRUSSELS, Aug. 28.—(A. P.)—The American Olympic oarsmen qualified easily in all the preliminary events in which they were entered, in the initial day of the Olympic regatta. Jack Kelly, Philadelphia, the American single sculler champion, defeated L. Junglof, of Sweden, by one and one half lengths in the single sculls, and Kelly and Paul Costello, in the double sculls, without coxswain, won from Hass and Veth of Holland by two and one half lengths. The time in these events was the fastest of the day.

The American midshipman eight defeated the Belgians by four lengths, leading all the way. The English eight won its heat in seven seconds

faster time than the midshipmen. The Swiss team had a good chance to win from the English until the coxswain swerved from the course while the oarsmen were spurring near the finish.

Sweden Wins Pentathlon
ANTWERP, Aug. 28.—Sweden completed the first three places in the modern pentathlon finals today when Dryssen, Deleval and Rund finished in the order named. Lieutenant Colonel Robert Sears and Captain Harold M. Rayner, American contestants, finished sixth and eighth, respectively.

The five events of the modern pentathlon are: Rapid fire at target with revolver or pistol at 25 meters range; 300 meters free style swimming; fencing; cross country riding (distance 5,000 meters) and cross country running (distance 4,000 meters).

U. S. Wins Wrestling
ANTWERP, Aug. 28.—The catch-as-catch-can wrestling championship was won by the American team with a total of 9 1-2 points. Finland was second with 8 points; Sweden third with 5 1-2; Switzerland fourth with 5 and England fifth with 2 points.

STANFORD CALLS OUT SQUAD FOR SEPT. 15

STANFORD UNIVERSITY, Aug. 28.—(A. P.)—Candidates for the 1920 Stanford University football team have been ordered by Head Coach Walter L. Powell and Captain A. P. Holt to report for opening practice September 15. Although Stanford has lost many members of the 1919 varsity, Powell and Holt think they will have material for a winning eleven.

Captain Holt, according to early reports, has not recovered entirely from injuries received playing last season. He is expected, however, to be able to take his old place in the backfield.

Two varsity football players, J. C. Patrick and C. R. Richter, are with the California team at the Antwerp Olympic games but are expected to return in time to play in all the games. Patrick, it is believed, will be fullback this year. Richter was center on the 1919 eleven.

Stanford's backfield ranks will be strengthened by the addition of R. W. Arnett, a former army player who has been mentioned by eastern sport writers for the All-American eleven. A prospect for tackle, Howard Deems, has transferred from Occidental College, Los Angeles, and will be eligible here this year.

Nevada to Visit Hawaii
RENO, Nevada, Aug. 28.—(A. P.)—Football games will be played by the University of Nevada this year with several Pacific Coast teams and with the University of Hawaii at Honolulu. The Honolulu trip will be made during the Christmas holidays.

Nevada's Thanksgiving Day game will be played at San Francisco against the University of Santa Clara. The University of Utah Agricultural College are on Nevada's schedule. An attempt is being made to schedule a game with the University of California.

Washington Starts September 15
SEATTLE, Aug. 28.—First football work at the University of Washington here this year will begin September 15, the earliest date permitted for practice by a new Pacific Coast Conference ruling. Coach "Stub" Allison, has arrived to take up his new work as head of the Washington coaching staff.

Washington's varsity eleven, which last year claimed the championship of the conference, opens its 1920 season with a game here against Whitman College.

BASEBALL ADJUDGED TO BE OUTSIDE PALE OF HAZARDOUS TASKS
TACOMA, Aug. 28.—(A. P.)—Baseball is not a hazardous occupation, Washington's state industrial insurance commission has ruled. The ruling said that workmen's compensation could not be paid to ball players on the payroll of state corporations or to professional players identified with baseball clubs.

A number of business firms in the state employ baseball teams each summer to advertise their business and to increase the morale among their employees. The decision was handed down when compensation was asked for one of the players who became injured in a game.
