G. O. P. DELEGATE FORSAKES HARDING TO SUPPORT COX

Illinois Delegate-at-Large Cannot Endure Reactionary Views of Nominee; Finds Cox is Progressive.

CHICAGO, Aug. 28.—Harold L. Ickes, one of the organizers of the Progressive party in Illinois, who was an Illinois delegate at large to the convention which nominated Senator Harding for president and voted against making the nomination unanimous, announced that he could not support Harding.

"Holding as I do that my duties and obligations as a citizen are paramount to my duties and obligations as a party man, I have concluded to support the democratic national ticket in this campaign," said Mr. Ickes in a signed statement. "I shall continue to affiliate with the republican party, but I cannot in good conscience support for president a candidate who was not the real choice of his party and whom I regard as unworthy and unfit to be the Chief Executive of this nation by the tests of ability, public policies, official record and independence of character."

Mr. Ickes declared the primaries showed that the republican party did not want Harding as its candidate and that his nomination was a "distinct shock to the progressive thought of the country."

"Senator Harding had an opportunity to repair the bad impression that his nomination created and he played in the McKinley role kept alive by a clearcut and ringing speech of acceptance that would have lined him up squarely as a forward-looking, progressive minded man," Mr. Ickes continued. "But once more he failed signally. His speech shows that he is not even satisfied to stand pat. He proclaims himself a reactionary. He would turn back the hands of the clock and satisfy the aspirations of men's souls by talking of a full stomach. No more uninspired and uninspiring utterance from a public man is of record in American political history."

"What Senator Harding believes in is not party government, but boss control. He has the Mark Hanna conception of party. He looks upon the republican senate cabal as the republican hosts and deceives himself that when Senators Smoot and Watson and Lodge, Murray, Crane, James H. H. and Col. Harvey met privately in a room in the Blackstone Hotel at 3 o'clock in the morning to decide upon him as the candidate and to determine his policies, the republican party was assembled together for solemn deliberation."

"Governor Cox's record is a distinctly progressive record," said Mr. Ickes. "That record proves that he looks upon public office as an opportunity for public service. He is standing in this campaign upon what he has achieved along progressive lines for the public welfare. His eyes are to the front, fixed on the future. He is not wallowing. And he is running as James M. Cox; he is not masquerading as a second edition of Grover Cleveland or a substitute Andrew Jackson."

DECLINE IN SUGAR IS ANNOUNCED TODAY

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 29.—The western sugar refining company has announced a reduction in the price of sugar from \$29 to \$17 per hundred pounds wholesale. It is the lowest price quoted here since April.

COUNTER OFFENSIVE TRIED BY RUSSIANS

LONDON, Aug. 29.—(A. P.)—Russian soviet forces engaged in a counter offensive against the Poles east of Brest-Litovsk have occupied four villages, says a Moscow wireless issued yesterday.

Through Service In Effect.
Through passenger service from Huntington to Portland on fast mail train No. 6, now in effect permits the purchase of tickets for riding in the day coach from points from Huntington to Portland. Local ticket agents state that tickets for the day coach of this train will be sold only from Pendleton to Portland. Thus if a passenger wishes to get off at Arlington, The Dalles, Hood River or any other station between here and Portland he must get a berth, or else pay fare from here to Portland. With the new plan, a coach is picked up by No. 5 at Huntington and carries passengers from that place, Baker, La Grande and Pendleton which are the only stops that the train will make.

DUTCH FREIGHTER GOES ASHORE IN HEAVY FOG

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 29.—(A. P.)—The Dutch freighter Arakan, 1,386 tons, en route from Batavia, Java, to San Francisco, went ashore yesterday in the fog five miles north of Point Reyes, on the coast about 30 miles north of here.

A wireless message from the vessel's captain to the marine department of

the chamber of commerce reported that the Arakan was resting on a sandy beach two hundred yards offshore. She was on an even keel and the sea was calm. He reported that

so apprehension was felt for the vessel's safety unless the sea should become heavy. Two tugs were on the way from San Francisco to extricate the Arakan, which was expected to be accomplished at high tide in the night.
