Water Board Postpones Trip

The proposed visit of the Pendleton Water Commission to Squaw creek Sunday was postponed on account of

the stormy weather. The commission had planned to examine possible additional summer water supplies near the head works of the present system. At a later date the board will make the trip.

Contractors Complete System

Geist Brothers, local contractors, this week will complete and turn over to the city of Heppner the water system they have had under construction during the past five months. It includes three dams, the diversion of Ditch creek into Willow creek and a pipe line 14 miles long. The system is said to be one of the most modern of Eastern Oregon and is ready for use as soon as accepted by the city.

Plans for Paving to be Made

City Engineer Frank B. Hays is at work on additional plans for paving on streets for which improvements have been petitioned. Among the jobs which will shortly be presented with estimates and specifications are Jefferson street from Washington to Jackson, Washington street from Jefferson to Main, Madison street from Jackson south one block, and Thompson south from Railroad street. All but the last named are on the north side of the river where extensive paving operations are in prospect.

Depot Is Renovated

The O. W. R. & N. passenger depot is being renovated. The walls are being calcedomined a pale tan and the woodwork will be refinished. Each

year the depot is improved before the coming of Round-Up.

Rifles and Binoculars Wanted

The Sheriff's office today made request to those who still have rifles, binoculars and flashlights not belonging to them to return them at once. Several of these articles were loaned for use in the chase of the prisoners who murdered Sheriff T. J. Taylor and have not all been returned.

Fisk in More Trouble

Fred H. Fisk, of Echo, who is held in jail on charges of child stealing and of larceny of jewelry, yesterday was fined \$5 and costs in justice court on a charge of having a license on his car other than that which was issued to him. He is serving time in the county jail and will have the added \$10 worth to serve out.

Clerks Will Convene

The county clerks of Oregon will hold their annual convention here after Sept. 22 and 23 or Sept. 23 and 24, County Clerk R. T. Brown said today. This is the first time this body has chosen Pendleton for a meeting place and the officials expect to see the Round-Up while not thrashing out their problems.

Golf Club Gets Locker House

A new locker house for the Pendleton Golf Club is to be made from the building used by the foreman in charge of construction on the Elks building and the Security apartments. The little frame structure was placed on a truck today and removed from in front of the Elks' temple to the golf club. It was sold to the club by Parker & Danfield, contractors.

Will Get Courses

Local teachers in the elementary schools are expecting to receive copies of the revised state course of study within the next few days. The books are now being mailed from the office of the state printer. The courses in civil government, geography, and language have been re-written while the courses in all the other essential subjects have been revised.

Wind Dries Soaked Fields

The stiff winds of Sunday, following the recent rains, aided materially in drying the wheat fields which have received a generous soaking of moisture. With today's bright skies and a breeze blowing, it was thought possible that some of the groves might return to harvest. Several fields have been badly damaged by the combination of wind and rain and some stands of grain are nearly flat as a result.

Rainfall Above Normal

The August rainfall was over four times the normal fall, according to Major Lee Moorhouse, official weather observer. The precipitation was 1.95 inches, the normal being .43 of an inch. Last year the total fall was only .11 of an inch. The hottest day of the month was on August 14 when the maximum was 103, and the coldest night was last night, when the minimum was 41. Today the maximum is 69. Rainfall Saturday night totalled .40 of an inch.

Apartments Being Finished

Tenants are being moved into the new Security apartment house at the rate of two or three a day, beginning today, as the various quarters are finished. Apartments on the third floor are being made ready first and those on the second floor will follow. Tenants are being notified as their apartments are ready for them. It is the hope of the owners to have the entire building completed for occupancy by the first of next week. A few families are already domiciled in the building.

Mrs. Watkins Buried

The funeral of the late Mrs. Beatrice Watkins was held yesterday afternoon from the Polson chapel, with Rev. G. L. Clark, pastor of the Presbyterian church, officiating. Mrs. Watkins was 54 years of age and was born in London, England. She came to Portland when 17 years of age and two years later married W. C. Watkins, now deceased. A son, Clarence Watkins, of Astoria, and a daughter, Elizabeth Watkins, of Albany, survive, also a sister, Mrs. Percy Kelley, of Albany, who was here for the funeral. Interment was at Olney cemetery.

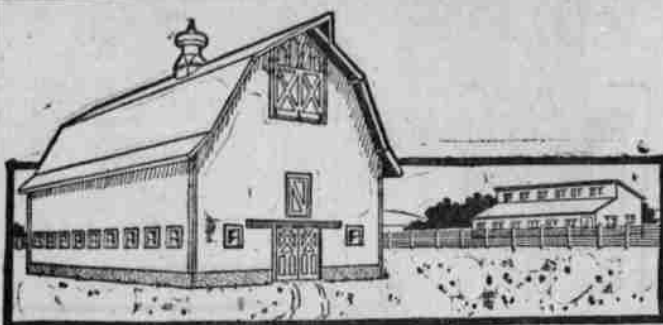
