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HARDING—THE IMPOSSIBLE

SENATOR HARDING Saturday directly announced his support of The Hague tribunal in preference to the League of Nations. It is a clarification of the position he assumed in his acceptance speech.

We had the Hague tribunal in 1914. It was operating full force but as a preventative of war it was as effective as a snowball in Hades. It stopped the war just like a bit of thread will hold a stampeding elephant. Where does the senator get his logic? Surely not from the men who went to France. Not from the fathers and mothers of the boys who fell? How can any sane man or woman be expected to place faith in The Hague tribunal? Why not rely on Mother Goose?

The Harding position is such that he hangs himself. His whole attitude has been that we must keep out of European affairs and "defend our constitution." Then why submit great issues to a world court at The Hague where our case would necessarily have to be passed on by foreigners. Are we to submit tariff disputes, the Monroe doctrine and the subject of Japanese immigration to The Hague? If Harding advocates that, what becomes of the republican campaign? Harding talks of putting teeth in the tribunal, but how could we put teeth in The Hague tribunal without adopting the substance of article 10? If a tribunal with teeth is a good thing then the League of Nations is a good thing and the Wilson support of the treaty of Versailles is right. If Harding believes what he tried to make out Saturday then he confesses that the senate's fight against the treaty was a crime and that all this clamor about the "sacrifice of America" is rot.

Obviously the Harding statement Saturday was made to pacify league supporters. Having helped keep America out of the league he wants to offer "something just as good." But it is a shallow proceeding and does not ring true. The American people will judge the man by his record, not by his repentance. The calibre of the Harding mind is shown by his claim that the League of Nations is a failure because it did not stop the Russian advance into Poland. It may be said that the Poles have been able to handle the bolshevik invasion themselves with French and English aid. But what of The Hague tribunal in 1914? Did it prevent war? As a sound reasoner Mr. Harding does not score heavily.

But here is the big weak point in the Harding position. We cannot scrap the treaty of Versailles without a new peace conference and a new treaty for Germany to sign. The treaty as it stands is punitive and was drafted while we had an army in France. The army is now disbanded and Germany could do as she pleased about signing a new treaty. Would we let Germany go free and escape punishment for starting the most cruel war of all the ages? The Harding position points in that direction. Is that the way to keep faith with our dead? If we want to hurry peace, how can we do it by scrapping the work of the Versailles conference and holding another conference? How does Harding know the other civilized powers would accept his view? All the great allied and neutral nations have joined the league. Shall we ask the universe to shift about just to please one front porch politician?

As a candidate for president Senator Harding is making himself more and more impossible.

PENDLETON WANTS RESULTS

THE water commission is right in giving close study at this time to the matter of a larger supply of pure water for Pendleton. The river water at Thorn Hollow may be good but we do not want it unless Bingham Springs is closed. It is up to the board to provide an ample supply without use of river water or else close Bingham Springs by purchase or condemnation. We are now using two or three times as much water as the city used when the gravity system was first built. Inside of five years we will probably be using twice as much as at present. The city is growing and improving. Every new home, every new lawn and park calls for additional water. It takes water to clean the streets and to sprinkle dirt streets. We must have this water or choke down the growth of the city. The fact our needs increase is a hopeful sign. Thank God we are going forward.

If this newspaper understands local sentiment the view of the people is that the water board should handle the subject vigorously and quickly. The people want results and they will back the board to the limit. If necessary to buy Bingham Springs or move the Blue mountains go to it.

The senate committee starts its investigation of the Harding campaign fund by calling Will Hays as the first witness. The committee will get the defense and then hear the prosecution—if there is any time left.

From stories told by local real estate men the census enumerators would now have a heavier job in Pendleton than they had last winter.

Too much easy money has been the cause of many downfalls and the rule applies in politics as elsewhere.

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"FLYING FINN" WINS

ANTWERP, Belgium.—When Hannes Kolehmainen won the classic marathon for Finland in the Olympic games it was almost like an American victory. The "Flying Finn" lives in Brooklyn, N. Y., but was unable to run for Jack Sam because he had not taken out U. S. citizenship papers. Kolehmainen finished the 26 miles and 385 yards in the remarkable time of 2:23:35.45, in mud and rain, breaking the old Olympic record by 4 minutes.

TWO AUTO RACERS BURNED TO DEATH AND LAD KILLED

County Fair Event at Santa Rosa Deals Death to Three When Winning Motor Veers From Track, Striking Boy.

SANTA ROSA, Calif., Aug. 29.—(A. P.)—Two automobile racers were burned to death beneath their overturned car and a 7-year old spectator they struck was instantly killed when a light car entered in the Sonoma county fair races here yesterday left the track and crashed into a tree. The dead are:

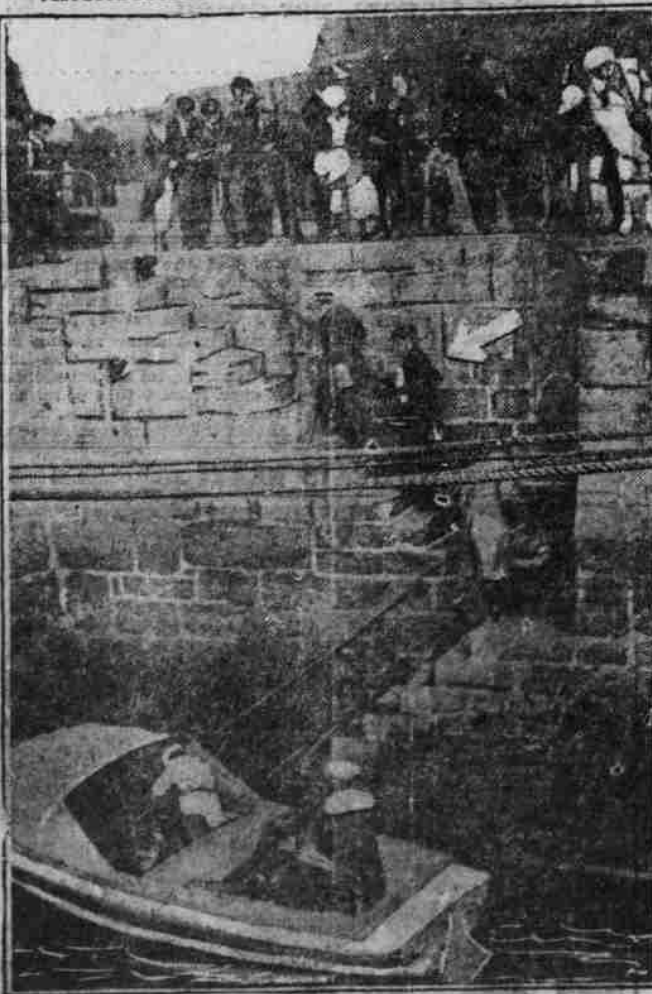
Arlo Beattie, 26, pilot, of Hanford, California.
Delbert Walker, 24, mechanic, Hanford, California.

Clarence Freese, 7, Santa Rosa. The accident happened in the nineteenth lap of the 50-mile free-for-all event. Beattie with a burst of speed had put his car well in the lead of the field of racers when the left rear wheel threw a tire. The car veered off the track and into a tree. The gasoline tank exploded and burst into flames. The Freese boy, struck down as he watched the race, was nearly decapitated.

Several thousand persons witnessed the tragedy. Prior to this accident a car piloted by Gilbert Wells of San Francisco, ran off the track and struck a tree. Wells escaped with a shaking up, his machine being only slightly damaged.

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PILLAGING IN BELFAST BECOMES MAD MELEE

BELFAST, Aug. 30.—(A. P.)—Eight men dead is the toll of Saturday night's fighting in Belfast. In addition to the six men killed during the height of the battle, two of the wounded died yesterday.

A feature of the rioting was the extent of the destruction of property by incendiaryism. The first brigade had an especially hard time during the night in fighting the flames. Their work was rendered hideous by the constant rattle of machine-guns. The Sinn Feiners were in strong force and appeared to be well supplied with guns and ammunition.

The greatest bitterness was displayed during the fighting. There was a great amount of wrecking of houses and the burning of furniture indoors and in the street. The yells of the mob, shrieks of women and children and groans of the injured were audible. When the rioting was at its worst, women could be seen in their night attire, rushing from their homes, attempting to lead their families from the danger zone.

HERMISTON MAN FEARS DEATH, REMAINS JAILED

James Beebe and son Earl James Beebe, of Hermiston, are at liberty on \$500 bail each and Clyde Herbert, also of Hermiston, is locked in the county jail here at his own request, fearing bodily harm to be done to him during the trial. The Beebes were held in bond to keep the peace following a hearing yesterday afternoon in Justice Joe H. Parker's court on a charge of threatening to kill Herbert.

The altercation arose over the forcing of a deed to a desert claim abandoned by the Beebes and just proved up by Herbert. The latter alleges that he has been forced to hand to them a deed to the place and that has been recorded here.

Civil action by Herbert to annul the deed is now pending, while criminal action probably will be taken against the pair on the threatened assault charge. While the two are at liberty, Herbert prefers to remain near the protection of the law.

Herbert's actions, which included his request to be locked up at Beho for safekeeping, led to an examination as to his sanity. County Judge Marsh and Dr. McPaul, county physician, pronounced him perfectly sane, but frightened by the threats of the Beebes.
