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WATER SPORTS AFFORD AMERICANS CHANCE TO TAKE ADDED LAURELS

All Swimming and Rowing
Races on Sunday's Olympic
Card Go to Entries Wearing
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ANTWERP, Aug. 30.—(A. P.)—The American swimming team won the final of the 400-meter swimming relay race Sunday, creating a new Olympic record of 10 minutes, 4 2-5 seconds. The team was composed of Duke Kahanamoku, Honolulu; Norman Ross, Illinois A. C.; Perry McGilivray, Illinois A. C.; and P. Keeloh, Honolulu.

The Australian team finished second and the English team third. The Olympic record, 10 minutes 11 1-5 seconds, was made by the Australians at Stockholm in 1912.

The final heat of the 400-meter relay Olympic swimming race for women was won by the American team. The Americans hung up a new Olympic record.

In the final heat of the 200-meter breast stroke, Malcoth, Sweden, was first in 3 minutes, 4 2-5 seconds. Henning, Sweden, was second; Aulten, Finland, third; J. Howell of Oakland, Calif., was fourth. The Olympic record is 4 minutes, 1 4-5 seconds.

The final of the 100-meter free style was won by Duke Kahanamoku, Honolulu, in 1 minute, 1 3-5 seconds. The previous record was 1:02 2-5. P. Keeloh, Honolulu, was second; W. W. Harris, Honolulu, third, and Herald, Australia, fourth.

The final in the 400-meter relay for women was won by the American team composed of Ethelda Bleibrey, Irene Guest, Mrs. Francis Schroth and Margaret Woodbridge, in 5 minutes, 11 4-5 seconds. Great Britain was second and Sweden third.

The Americans made a clean sweep in the springboard diving for women: Alleen Huggins, New York, winning with Helen Walnwright, New York, second, and Thelma Payne, Portland, third.

Kelly Takes Sculling Title

BRUSSELS, Aug. 30.—(A. P.)—Jack Kelly, Philadelphia, single sculler, champion of the United States, defeated J. Beresford, Jr., British sculler, in the final of the Olympic single sculling race Sunday. Kelly's time was 7 minutes, 35 seconds and Beresford's 7 minutes 36 seconds.

Kelly also doubled with the American Castello for the double sculls, the pair winning easily by five lengths from Italy after taking the lead at the 1,000 meters.

American Crew Victorious
BRUSSELS, Aug. 30.—(A. P.)—The American eight-oared crew defeated the British eight in the final of the Olympic race for eight-oared boats with coxswains Sunday. The Americans covered the distance in 5 minutes 55 seconds to the Englishmen's 6 minutes, 5 4-5 seconds. The time was a new world's record for the 2,000 meters.

Francis Diver Surpasses
ANTWERP, Aug. 30.—(A. P.)—C. Pinkston, Olympic club, San Francisco Sunday won the final of the fancy diving contests of the Olympic games. He defeated Allert, of Sweden, H. Priests, Los Angeles A. C., was third and L. J. Bohlack, New York A. C., sixth.

FRENCH REVENGE FOR ANTWERP GAMES ADDS TO U. S. VICTORIES

American Team Participating
at Columbus Scores 134 to
128 for Sweden; Strong
Wind Slows Distance Events

COLUMBUS, France, Aug. 30.—The United States again Sunday carried away first honors in a monster athletic meet organized by the Union of Sporting Federation of France. The event has been widely advertised in France as "a revenge for the Antwerp Olympic games."

The American team scored 124 points, Sweden 128 and France 78. Some 25,000 persons attended. A strong wind made fast time by the distance runners impossible. France in the long runs was handicapped by the absence of her star performer, Guillemot, who is still lame.

Gaston Vidal, deputy president of the Union of Sporting Federations, said that France would make a strong bid for the Olympic games of 1924.

In the 110-meter hurdles Earl Thompson, Dartmouth college star, was first, H. E. Barron, Meadow Brook club, Philadelphia, second, and J. M. Watt, Ithaca, N. Y., third. Time 15 2-5 seconds. Thompson represented Canada.

The 100-meter flat dash was won by Charles W. Paddock, Los Angeles A.

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C. in 10 4-5 seconds. J. V. Scholz, University of Missouri, second; Mourlain, France, third; Alkahlan, France, fourth, and Nils Engdahl, Sweden, fifth.

The 400-meter hurdles was won by Floyd Smart, Chicago A. A., in 55 2-5 seconds; Georges Andre, France, second; Carl Christensen, Sweden, third, and "Bilby" Meakin, Boston A. A., fourth.

Engdahl, Sweden, was first in the 400-meter flat race in 49 3-5 seconds. Delvart, France, was second; J. W. Driscoll, Boston A. A., third; R. S. Emery, Chicago A. A., fourth and Malm, Sweden, fifth.

In the shot putting, Wilson of Sweden was first with 14 2-5 meters; H. B. Liveredge, United States navy, second; Janssen, Sweden, third, and G. H. Bihlman, Olympic Club, San Francisco, fourth.

M. M. Kirksey, Olympic Club, San Francisco, won the 200-meter dash; Lorrain, France, was second; Vaste, France, third; Clegard, France, fourth, and Renard, France, fifth. Kirksey's time was 21 3-5 seconds which equals the world's record. Kirksey was all in at the finish.

The 1,500-meter run was won by Lundgren, Sweden; M. L. Shields, Meadow Brook club, Philadelphia, was second; Burtin, France, third; J. J. Conolly, Boston A. A., fourth. Time 4 minutes, 2-5 seconds.

H. H. Brown, Boston A. A., won the 5000 meter race in 15 minutes, 27 seconds. Denys, France, was second; Ivan C. Dresser, New York A. C., third, and Bachman, Sweden, fourth.

R. W. Landon, New York A. C., won the high jump with 1 3-4 meters. Ekelund, Sweden, was second and Lowden, France, third.

The American team, Paddock, Kirksey, Scholz and Woodring, finished first in the 400-meter relay in 42 2-5 seconds. France was second and Sweden third.

The pole vault was won by E. E. Meyers, Chicago A. A., with Rudgers, Sweden, second and Franqueneille, France, third. Meyers cleared 2 3-4 meters.
