Shy Huntington has quite a job on his hands at Oregon this fall and the results he gets out of the new team which will have to be built up will be watched with interest in this state by the many who are strong for the former Eugene star. Shy has Bart Spellman again to yield a line and if there is anything at all in the available material, the Oregon machine should give a good account of itself.

Aggies Will Bear Watching The Aggies, which, year after year have had star material and mediocre coaching, this season has Rutherford and a flock of assistants to work out a winner. The situation at O. A. C. is much like that at Washington, the results will depend upon the coaching, for the men are veterans and will be back for the season with lots of experience behind them.

George Smith, veteran end, and Arthur Thelsen, end and fullback, are the two men who are lost by the purple and gold. The left side of Washington's line, which contains three men who had their first football under Gil Dohie in his last season at Seattle, is intact. Only the right end is missing from last year's line. Captain Ted Faulk, Bill Grimm, Buel Blake, Sandy Wick, Gus Pope and Zeke Clarke are the regular linemen expected back. In addition Laurie Smith, sub center and himself a letter winner, is available for line duty. In the backfield are Ray Eckman, Bob Abel and Phil Butler, with a world of material to fill the other position.

At this season all the institutions are ending out optimistic reports. There is promise of some high class pigskin clashing on all the fields for the snappier days of autumn and not a few Pendletonians are laying away a bit for the rainy day when Oregon battles Washington or O. A. C. down the valley.

P.)—The fastest mile trotted by a two year old this year was made at the opening of the Grand Circuit races at Bendville Monday when the Ohio trainer, Charles Valentine, drove the chestnut colt Bogalusa in 2:08 in the second heat of the Horse Breeder Futurity. Valentine's colt finished first in the initial heat, but on account of running under the wire was set back to second place and the heat awarded to Nelson Dillon.

The historic Neponset stake for 2:08 pacers was the only event finished, rain falling after Will Crozier, substituting for Tom Murphy, won the deciding heat with John Henry. Best time 2:02¾. Walter Cox won the first heat of the Boston Globe stake for three year old trotters with The Great Miss Morris, but his filly went to a wild break, the second time out and was distanced. Both heats were run in 2:11¾.
