NOTICE OF STREET IMPROVEMENT
Notice is hereby given that at a regular meeting of the Common Council of the City of Pendleton, held on August 14th, 1920, the following resolution was duly adopted:

Whereas, the City Surveyor of the City of Pendleton, did on the 19th day of Aug., 1920, under directions and by requirement of the Common Council file in the office of the Recorder of the City of Pendleton, plans and specifications for an appropriate improvement of the following named streets in said city:

Mark street from the east line of Matlock street to the west line of Bush street;

Perkins avenue from the south line of Haley street to the northern line of Walters' mill race;

Logan street from the south line of Haley street to the north line of Mark street;

together with the estimates of the cost to be borne and the probable cost thereof with a statement of the lots, parts of lots and parcels of land to be benefited by such improvement and the percentage of the total cost of improvement, which each of such lots, parts of lots and parcels of land should pay an account of the benefits to be derived from such improvement; and

Whereas, the council has examined such plans and specifications and estimates and found the same satisfactory and the estimates therefor to be in accordance with the probable cost of such work and

Whereas, the property recommended by the City Surveyor to be included within the boundaries of the district benefited is in the judgment of the common council properly to be included within such improvement district and no property is excluded therefrom which should properly be included therein; and

Whereas, the improvement of the hereinabove described portions of said streets either with Gravel Bitulithic Pavement, Concrete Pavement or Warrentite Bitulithic Pavement on Crushed Rock or Crushed Gravel foundation, is at this time necessary; therefore, be it

Resolved, by the common council of the City of Pendleton that it is expedient to improve and it is hereby proposed to improve said portions of Mark street, Perkins avenue and Logan street by paving the same with either Gravel Bitulithic Pavement, Concrete Pavement or Warrentite Bitulithic Pavement on Crushed Rock or Crushed Gravel foundation, such pavement to be finished upon the established grade of said streets and the streets to have curbs and gutters and all other things in accordance with and as shown in the plans and specifications for the improvement of said portions of said Mark street, Perkins avenue and Logan street, prepared by F. B. Hayes, City Surveyor, filed with the recorder of said city on the 19th day of August, 1920, which said plans and specifications are hereby particularly referred to, and be it further

Resolved, that the engineer's estimates of the probable total cost of such improvement, which said city engineer's estimates were made and pre-

pared by F. B. Hayes, city surveyor of said city, in the sum of \$29,200.19, and was filed with the recorder of said city, on the 19th day of August, 1920, is hereby included and hereby referred to particularly; and be it further

Resolved, that the plans and specifications and estimates for such improvements as prepared by the city surveyor and filed with the recorder of the City of Pendleton on the 19th day of August, 1920, be and they are hereby adopted and approved, and be it further

Resolved, that the cost of making such improvements shall be a charge and lien upon all lots, parts of lots and parcels of land to be benefited by such improvement, and the owners of such lots, parts of lots and parcels of land, so specially benefited by such improvement shall be liable for the payment of the costs thereof, and be it further

Resolved, that an Assessment District is hereby created to be known as "Assessment District No. 72," embracing the property benefited and to be assessed for the payment of such improvements, which Assessment District shall include all lots, parts of lots and parcels of land lying and being within the district bounded and described as follows, to-wit:

Description of Assessment District No. 72.
Beginning at the northwest corner of Lot 7, Block 18, Haley's Addition, thence 190 feet east and parallel with the north line of Mark street; thence 100 feet north and parallel with the west line of Lincoln street; thence 250 feet east and parallel with the north line of Perkins avenue; thence east 250 feet on the south line of Haley

street; thence south 250 feet and parallel with the east line of Logan street; thence east 390 feet on the north line of Lot 6, Block 2, Haley's Addition; thence south 108.75 feet on the west line of Bush street and its southern extension; thence 252 feet, more or less, west and parallel with the south curb line of Mark street between the west line of Bush street and the west line of Logan street; thence south 5.25 feet on the southerly extension of the west line of Logan street; thence 190 feet west and parallel with the east line of Perkins avenue; thence west 100 feet and parallel with the south line of Mark street; thence south 25 feet west and parallel with the south line of Mark street; thence east 195.3 feet, more or less, until said line intersects with the east line of Perkins avenue at a point 152.75 feet south from the southwest corner of intersection of Perkins avenue and Mark street; thence 195.3 feet, more or less, in a southerly direction until said line intersects with the southerly extension of the center line running north and south through Block 2, Haley's Addition at a point 184.5 feet from the south line of Mark street; thence 25.00 feet north on said center line to the north line of Mark street; thence 520 feet and parallel with the south line of Mark street; thence north 190 feet and parallel with the west line of Lincoln street; thence west 100 feet and parallel with the south line of Mark street; thence 150 feet north on the east line of Matlock street to the point of beginning.

And be it further

Resolved, that a copy of this resolution together with the notice that the

Surveyor's estimate of the proportion of the cost of said work to be charged against each lot, part of lot and parcel of land is on file in the office of the City Recorder by published for a period of ten days in the East Oregonian, which newspaper is hereby designated as the Common Council for the publication thereof.

And notice is further given that the surveyor's estimate of the proportion of the cost of said work to be charged against each lot, part of lot and parcel of land within the Assessment District in said resolution described is on file in the office of the City Recorder.

EIGHT CLUBS PROBABLE FOR CIRCUIT NEXT YEAR

TACOMA, Wash., Sept. 1.—(A. P.)—Plans are under way to increase the Pacific International Baseball League to eight clubs next season. L. H. Burnett, Tacoma, president of the league, announced here recently.

Six clubs, Tacoma, Spokane, Yakima, Seattle, Vancouver and Victoria made

up the league this year. President Burnett said it was probable Bellingham and Walla Walla would be added.

The 1920 season was very successful, President Burnett said. The league was organized early this year to take over the territory held by the old Northwest League.

Rumors that Seattle will drop from the league next year, an account of lack of support, were denied by Burnett.

SANTA CLARA FOOTBALL TEAM HOLDING PRACTICE

SANTA CLARA, Cal., Sept. 1.—(A. P.)—University of Santa Clara football players, who already are training at Manresa, Cal., near here, for the 1920 season, probably are the first college players of the Pacific Coast to get down to real work on the gridiron this year.

Manresa will be Santa Clara's training ground until September 1, when school opens here. Fifteen men are

on the Manresa squad, working under Coach Bob Harmon and Assistant Coach Eddie Rousch.

Eleven veterans, enough for a team, will be back at Santa Clara, this season, Cosmar Manzelli, former star high school player of San Francisco, is captain.
