WOULD AWAIT MORE STABLE RULE BEFORE GIVING INDEPENDENCE

MANILA, P. I., Sept. 7.—The question of independence for the Philippines was discussed by two United States senators, members of the congressional party here on a tour of the Far East, before their departure for Hongkong.

Senator William J. Hays, of Georgia said:

"I would favor Philippine independence when the Philippines have established a stable government and clearly demonstrated that they are able to maintain it."

Senator Thomas Sterling of North Dakota said:

"I am not in favor of granting independence to the Philippines at this time, and I do not favor fixing any time for the granting of independence."

ENTRANCE REQUESTS FLOOD INTO O. A. C.

OREGON AGRICULTURE COLLEGE, Sept. 7.—Applications for entrance in the college in the fall are coming in rapidly, credentials having been received to date from 522 persons wishing to enter the freshman class, or a 30 per cent increase over the same date last year, according to report by the registrar. Fifty-seven transfers from other institutions have been made, including colleges and universities in ten states outside of Oregon.

WILL FIGHT STRIKE WITH CHEAPER FOOD

CLANFARNA, Rome, Sept. 7.—(U. P.)—In the face of prospects of a general strike, government officials appear more optimistic today regarding the acute industrial situation which resulted in the seizure of 145 factories by locked-out metal workers. Executives of the socialist party adopted a resolution to appeal to all Italian organized labor to proclaim its solidarity with the metal workers.

Despite this action, confidence is expressed in government circles that the acute situation will soon be adjusted. This resulted from a proposal to manufacturers to indirectly grant workers increased wages by organizing in each city cooperative stores where food will be sold at cost.

ROME, Sept. 7.—(A. P.)—Marked earthquakes were reported at 8 o'clock this morning from a point in Tuscany. Casualties resulted, the reports stated. Aid has been sent.
