COX POINTS TO NEED FOR RECLAMATION WORK

MELEE IN ITALY IS HELD STEP IN RUSSIAN SCHEME

Seizure of Factories Declared First Move in Vast Conspiracy With Restless Radicals Through Europe.

BOLSHEVIKI PUSH ON IN RENEWED COUNTER

Despite Decision of Socialists Not to Call General Strike, Red Arm Sweeps in Scores More Industries.

LONDON, Sept. 13.—(U. P.)—The Post today declared seizure of factories by Italian workers is the first step of a vast conspiracy to overthrow the existing governments of Europe.

Red Military Wins.

LONDON, Sept. 13.—(U. P.)—An official bolshevik communique, made public here today reported that General Wrangel's army in the Crimea region is again being virtually wiped out.

The statement also declares that the Poles are retreating before a new Russian counter offensive in the vicinity of Brest-Litovsk.

Seizures Continue.

ROME, Sept. 13.—(U. P.)—Despite a decision by the majority of workmen's, socialist representatives not to proclaim a general strike or to transform the present economic agitation into a political struggle, scores of textile mills in Milan, Alexandria and other provinces were seized today.

Dispatches received said 25 have been taken over in Turin alone. Troop trains were held up in Bologna Parma by order of railroad workers syndicate that no troops should be transported in northern Italy.

STRIKE CONTINUATION PREDICTED BY OFFICIAL

CHICAGO, Sept. 13.—(U. P.)—Continuation of the "outlaw" strike on railroad switchmen which has hampered transportation several months, is predicted by President Reading, of the engineers' association today.

Death Threats Come.

CORK, Sept. 13.—(A. P.)—Eleven hunger strikers in the Cork Jail are still alive but all are materially weaker. Two, Burke and Kennedy, collapsed twice during the night. Sean Hennessy, 19, is in a comatose condition.

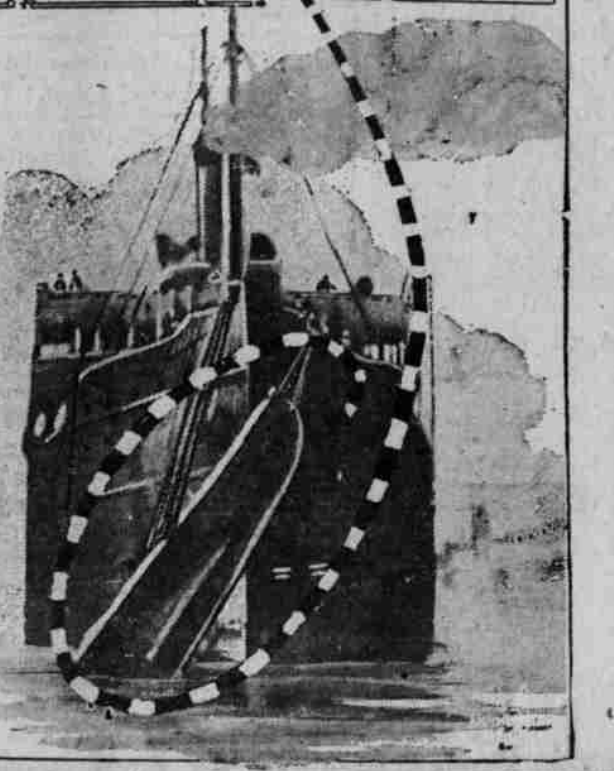
SUGAR PRICE DROPS

GOVERNOR ADVOCATES BUDGET COMMISSIONER

Would Appeal for Elimination of Petty, Annoying and Unfair War Taxes Showing Sectional Prejudice.

PORTLAND, Sept. 13.—(A. P.)—Outlining details of his financial policy which includes proposals for a budget commissioner to act as executive assistant to the president, and declaring the need of development in Alaska, Governor Cox delivered an address at noon today.

Governor Cox was introduced by Senator Chamberlain, who was praised by the governor.

For Organization of Bureaus.

PORTLAND, Sept. 13.—(U. P.)—Business reorganization of governmental bureaus with an efficient budget system as its outstanding feature was pledged by Governor Cox in his speech here today.

Referring to aid for service men, Governor Cox declared the trip through the northwest has convinced him that the vast undeveloped public domain in this section offers in some measure a means of the government paying its debt to those who fought the battles of the world war.

For Petty Tax Repeal.

SALEM, Sept. 13.—(A. P.)—Governor Cox in an address here this morning advocated the league of nations and advocated tax reduction and repeal of "petty and annoying" war taxes.

Alleges Law Crippling Plot.

SALEM, Ore., Sept. 13.—(U. P.)—"Documents are in existence to show that big bankers are seeking to gain control of the federal reserve system," Cox charged in a speech here this morning.

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
