

WEAKNESS CHARGED IN IRISH REPRESSION

LONDON, Oct. 4.—(U. P.)—England's policy of repression in Ireland is a mark of weakness, Lord Morely, former secretary for Ireland, declared. He denounced reprisals by police, and declared that failure to check them

was an admission of failure on the part of the government. The statement of Arthur Griffith, Sinn Fein leader, that reprisals were not only condoned but were part of the government's policy, was denied in an official statement.

RIDING TWO HORSES IS HARDING'S JOB; IT MAY BRING FALL

Borah-Johnson Group on One Hand and Taft-Root-Wickersham Element are Diametrically Opposed.

PORTLAND, Or., Oct. 5.—It is generally conceded hereabouts that Senator Harding is rapidly being brought face to face with the greatest problem he will have to solve during the presidential campaign. It is also generally believed that failure to meet it successfully will mean his Waterloo. The problem is to hold to his support the two opposing factions on the League of Nations question.

The entrance in the campaign of President Wilson with his first appeal for the League will bring the issue to a head. The arrival from Europe of Elihu Root, a league advocate, has increased the pressure on the Ohio senator. And finally, the cancellation of his speaking engagements under the auspices of the republican national committee by Senator Borah has made it doubly difficult for Harding to continue to carry water on both shoulders.

Unquestionably, President Wilson's campaign will deal entirely with the league. To gain the vote of the pro-league republicans, who undoubtedly can swing the election one way or the other, Senator Harding must not attempt to meet the Wilson drive. To do so, he will be compelled to take a definite stand.

The arrival of Elihu Root was hailed by eastern newspapermen as an event that would further complicate matters for the Ohio senator. Root has had a part in the building of the league. He is known to favor it. It was announced that he would force Harding to again change his position relative to foreign affairs.

But the Borah action, and his future acts, are contemplated by the Harding lieutenants as perhaps the most menacing of any recent occurrences. Borah says he will have no league. Hiram Johnson says he will have no league. Senator Harding has said he approves their statements.

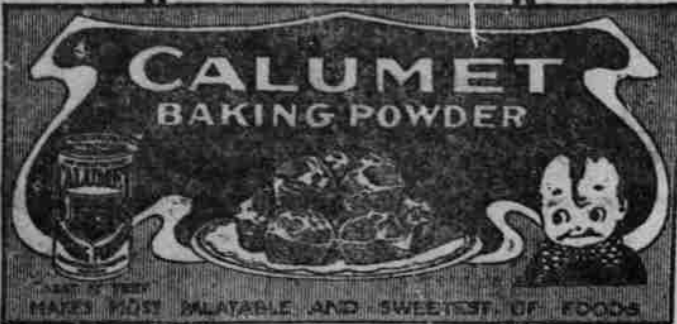
But while he was holding the irreconcilables in line with his no league statements, he was holding up the old Hague tribunal with teeth, and "an association of nations" of some kind as bait for the pro-league republicans who are waiting to the last minute to bolt in the hope that the candidate of their party may take a position that will allow them to vote for him and the league.

Observers now see the prospect of Harding being forced by Borah and Johnson to come out stronger against any league. With that eventuality they say the pro-league republicans will desert him almost in a body. It would almost certainly defeat him in November, they believe. On the other hand, if the Ohio senator can get votes of both pro-leaguers and anti-leaguers, the latter of which he is assured, he will have met his severest test of the campaign. And he will have done something that few presidential candidates have been able to do—get the votes of two groups that are diametrically and unalterably opposed.

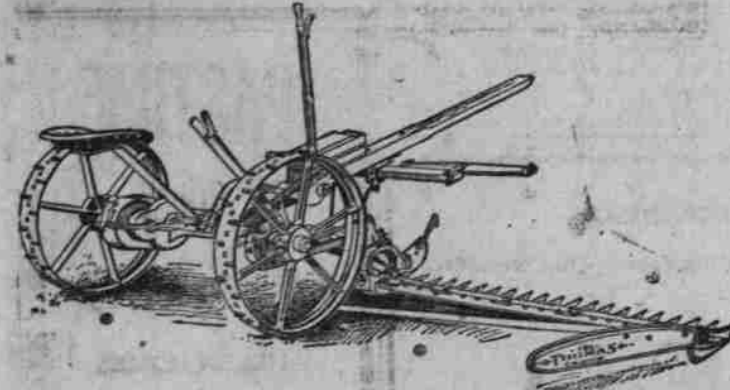
