**REV. CLARK IS MADE
PRESBYTERIAN PASTOR**

Last night marked the installation of Rev. George L. Clark as the new pastor of the First Presbyterian church. Installation was held in the church which was filled with local people.

Dr. W. H. Bleakney, of Walla Walla, gave the sermon. The charge to the pastor was given by Rev. W. H. Boddy of Hood River and the charge to the people by Rev. E. F. Harper, of Milton. Rev. J. M. Cornelson, Presbyterian missionary at Tutuila, gave the installation prayer.

An all day session of the Presbytery of Pendleton preceded the installation. Present at the sessions were Dr. Bleakney, Rev. Harper, Rev. H. E. Wilbur, of Milton, Rev. E. E. McVickers of Moro; Rev. Boddy, Rev. E. J. Connor, Indian minister from Tutuila; Rev. Clark, Rev. Cornelson, Rev. W. L. Van Noy, state superintendent of religious education, and P. J. Hegeman, of the local church.

The Presbytery received an overture from the general assembly asking advice as to the ordaining of women as elders, and sent an affirmative answer.

Dr. Bleakney was elected commissioner to attend the general assembly at Winona Lake, Indiana, next year in May, and Rev. Cornelson was chosen alternate.

BOSTON, Oct. 12.—(A. P.)—Governor Coolidge has refused the request of President Lowell of Harvard, heading the League of Nations Day committee that the governors of all states proclaim Sunday, October 24, as "League of Nations Day."

BOSTON, Oct. 12.—(U. P.)—Governor Coolidge republican candidate for vice president, today refused to proclaim October 24 as "League of Nations Day" declaring that he would not use his office of governor "for the dissemination of political propaganda by an official proclamation resented by many of the people."

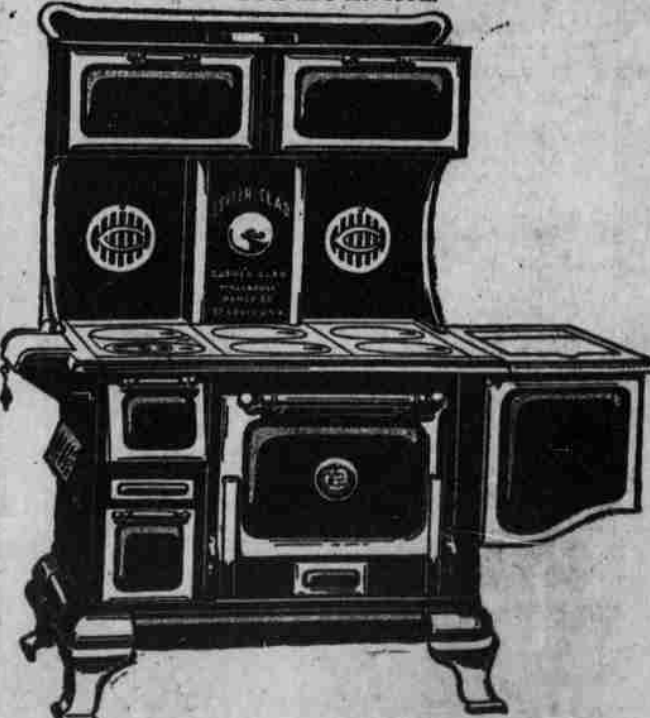
