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### HOME READING FOR

**HIGH SCHOOL STUDENTS**  
The English department of the high school requires as part of its work the thorough reading and reviewing of

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two books each semester. Formerly the lists from which choice was made consisted largely of classical fiction, essays and material which, although good in itself, was not of present day interest.

Last year a change was made and some of the best works of newer authors was included, fully half of which was non-fiction. Each pupil was required to choose one book from the "light" or fiction list and one from the "heavy" or non-fiction list. The result was better than anticipated and the interest of the pupils in worthy subjects was proved.

This year what is hoped will be a

still further improvement has been adopted by Miss Severance, head of the English department and each class is given a list consisting of four groups from which to select two books for this semester and later two more for the second semester. One title is to be selected from each of the four groups. The group headings are "travel," "biography," "miscellaneous" and "fiction" with the exception of "war books" in the place of the Sophomore travel list.

This home reading course should give the students a broader outlook on the important affairs of the world as well as an appreciation of good books. Choices are to be made by the students this week and reading to be begun next week. The interest of parents will do much to make the course valuable.

The freshman and sophomore and junior lists will be published tomorrow and suggestion is made that the lists be clipped and saved for future reference.
