

OVER 100 REPUBLICAN SUPPORTERS TURN TO COX AND RATIFICATION

Representative Men and Women Repudiate 'Little America' Party and Sign Long List for Patriotism First.

NEW YORK, Oct. 18.—(A. P.)—A joint statement by "over one hundred representative men and women who have usually supported the republican or progressive tickets," announcing their intention to vote for Cox and Roosevelt and those senatorial candidates "who stand honestly and frankly for ratification of the treaty and adherence to the league," was made public last night by Hamilton Holt, magazine editor.

This statement set forth that "it is now too late to talk of a new 'association of nations' to be created under republican auspices," and repudiating the present republican leadership that "has permitted the republican party to become a 'little America' party," urged all republicans and progressives to "put patriotism above party" and add their names to the list of signers.

This list, according to Mr. Holt, is increasing daily. An analysis said that it included 15 republican officers of the league to enforce peace; clergymen representing all the principal denominations; the presidents of Oberlin, Vassar, Smith, Bryn Mawr and Mount Holyoke colleges; several veterans of the great war and nine former republican or progressive party managers and officeholders. In the last classification were listed Charles P. Howland of New York; Violet M. Leroy, New York; Theodore Marburg, Baltimore; W. W. Nichols, Bennington, Vt.; Herbert Parsons, New York; Elias D. Seligman, Indianapolis; Edwin E. Simon, New York; Richard Welling, New York; and Alice White, Wellesley, Mass.

COMES TO IDENTIFY BODY AND IS SHOT

DUBLIN, Oct. 18.—(A. P.)—Sergeant Roche of the Royal Irish constabulary, who came here from Tipperary to identify the body of Mr. Tracey, who was shot during the disturbances Friday, was shot dead yesterday on the Ormond Quay. A man and a girl also were wounded by his assailants.

WHITE SAYS COUNTRY HAS TURNED TO COX

NEW YORK, Oct. 18.—George White, chairman of the democratic national committee, declared in a statement last night that the "political tide, which last Saturday was at the turn, is now sweeping toward the democrats."

"It is too late for the republicans to arrest it," he said. "The controlling voters who have been waiting with great patience for Senator Harding to take an honest stand for the great issue accepted what he said at Des Moines as his real conviction. They felt he had broken the bonds of deceitful strategy just once."

Senator Harding's statement that he stands for rejection, Mr. White said made a clear issue between the league of nations with clarifying and protecting reservations and no league at all. The people accepted it and the rush to the league side—the democratic side—began.

KID M'COY NOW FREE TO WOO AND WIN NINTH WIFE

LOS ANGELES, Oct. 18.—(U. P.)—Another chapter in the matrimonial experiences of Norman Selby, better known as Kid McCoy, former prizefighter, now a movie actor, is a divorce granted to Carmen Broadner Selby, aged 29, his eighth wife, on the grounds of cruelty.

"This man will get another wife if I grant the divorce," Judge Jackson said. "Perhaps it would be well for this girl to act as a buffer for the rest of the community." Nevertheless he granted the divorce.

Wheat Crop Profitable

REGINA, Sask., Oct. 18.—(A. P.)—On a basis of \$2.50 a bushel, net, the cash value of the wheat crop now being taken off government greater production farms in Saskatchewan and Alberta is placed at \$2,500,000 by W. M. Graham, Indian commissioner here. Mr. Graham would not venture an estimate of operating expenses, but admitted that the profit on the venture for the present year would be well over a million dollars. The wheat crop is placed at 500,000 bushels. Approximately 20,000 acres were sown in wheat this year. The yield on the Alberta land is announced at 45 bushels to the acre, though the value estimate is on the basis of 40 bushels to the acre. Saskatchewan's quota to the total will yield only about 15 bushels to the acre.
