OREGON DUE TO SHOW SPEED IN FIRST REAL CONTEST TOMORROW

University of Idaho is Eugene Eleven's Competitor While Aggies Journey to Meet Sun Dodgers on Seattle Gridiron.

University of Oregon's football eleven will swing into action tomorrow at Eugene against its first college opponents of the present season, the University of Idaho.

Idaho had its initial hard game last Friday when Tom Kelley's boys lost to Washington State College by a touchdown. Bart Spellman, Oregon line coach, saw the game and said when he was here on his way back to Eugene, that Oregon "could beat Idaho but it would be a game."

Aggies Meet Washington. To supporters of Oregon Agricultural College, the game at Seattle tomorrow between the Aggies and the University of Washington will be of chief concern. Washington has met both Whitman and Montana and suffered defeat at the hands of the cowboys. O. A. C. was held scoreless by Multnomah club in the only big game Ruth-erford's squad has played.

The lack of competition for O. A. C. will send the men into the fray with less injuries than Washington, however. Bear stories from the Sun Dodger camp say that most of the veterans are out of play because of injuries, including Captain Paulk, all coast end. Washington is picked to take the long end of the score despite the handicaps.

In the south U. S. C. meets Occidental college at Los Angeles and Stanford plays at Santa Clara. California meets Utah on the Berkeley field. The showing of these teams at home will be watched for their effect on the coast conference standings.

Coach Leonard Allison's University of Washington football eleven will meet the team of the Oregon Agricultural college on University field here Saturday. They, drubbing given the Sun Dodgers by the Montana eleven last week has caused Coach Allison to call in help of former stars of Washington and the local men have been coached through a week of hard practice to help of former stars of Washington.

By one week from tomorrow the conference championship race will be well on its way with the University of Oregon playing at Stanford University and the University of California meet-

ing the Oregon Aggies on the Corvallis Ore., gridiron.

Stanford Meets Santa Clara. SANTA CLARA, Cal., Oct. 22.—(A. P.)—Football teams of Stanford University and the University of Santa Clara meet here tomorrow in the most important game scheduled for the local gridiron this year. Special trains will bring former students of the two schools from nearby points for the game.

Santa Clara players and supporters expect to win and claim that Stanford's defeat by the University of Southern California last Saturday at Los Angeles indicates that the Corvallis eleven this year is not as strong as Stanford teams of the past. Stanford is coming to Santa Clara with a strengthened team and hopes to start its 1920 victories with a win over the local team. Poor work in handling the ball and fumbling has been given as the reason for Stanford's defeat in the south.

HARVARD IS PREPARED FOR MIRACLE ELEVEN

CAMBRIDGE, Mass., Oct. 22.—(A. P.)—Harvard University's preparations for the game Saturday with the "Wonder Eleven" of Center College, are being made both on the field and in the box office on a scale comparable with the usual preliminaries for the annual contest with Yale. Tickets for the stadium have been exhausted, although extra stands have been ticketed into every available space.

Close to 20,000 persons will see the game, the first real test against a big college team for the eleven which has gone through two seasons without defeat. Captain Horween of Harvard, who has been out of the game for ten days because of an injury to his side, probably will have to stay on the sidelines and Sedwick, first string tackle, also will be missing.

CALIFORNIA EDUCATOR WILL BACK COV. COX

LOS ANGELES, Oct. 22.—Roy Malcolm, professor of political science in the University of Southern California and executive secretary of the Los Angeles county unit of the League to Enforce Peace, has announced his intention to support Governor Cox because of his stand for the League of Nations. "I am voting the democratic ticket," said Malcolm, "because I believe it has a clearer vision of the twentieth century place of the United States in the family of nations. It is foolish to talk about isolation when here in my isolation and has not been here in a generation, especially since 1918, take this stand upon my individual responsibility and not as representing the institution with which I am connected."

CINCINNATI, Oct. 22.—(U. P.)—Howard Phillips, 34, part owner of a chain of bakeries in Ohio, Indiana and Kentucky was instantly killed Wednesday night at Newport near here, by J. B. Murray, 28, a former partner. Phillips was with Murray's wife when the shooting occurred. Murray then ordered a taxi and drove to police headquarters, hid his automobile on the desk and said: "There it is. I just shot a man. He broke up my home." Mrs. Murray will seek a divorce on the grounds of cruelty, she said.
